From the Dean's Desk

A CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

25 December 2017



Dear Friends,

Over the last four weeks of Advent we have been asked to stay awake, to prepare for the coming of the Lord, to rejoice in his presence and to believe and trust in the often strange and surprising ways of God. Today we have reached the point where we put it all together, for today we hear again the same words heard by the shepherds on that first Christmas night: ***'Behold, I bring you good news of great joy which will come to all people, for to you is born in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord' [Luke 2:10-11].***

This news of great joy is none other than the birth of the Son of God, Jesus Christ. In our liturgy, Preface II of the Nativity of the Lord seems to capture the intensity and solemnity of what we are celebrating, as it says: ***'For on the feast of this awe-filled mystery, though invisible in his own divine nature, he has appeared visibly in ours'.***

As we contemplate the scene of the Nativity in the images placed in the Crib, we need to spend time reflecting that this small Child is more than simply a new creation. This Baby is indeed God physically manifested in our time, under our conditions. It is the moment when Humanity and God meet in the most intimate, beautiful and powerful way.

Our Christian vocation is to allow that presence of the Divine Child to grow stronger in our hearts and lives, so that we may think, live and pray as he showed us. This indeed is Good News that we celebrate today. And it is Good News not only for us but for the whole world.

This Good News is for us and for all people. It is news that we first take to heart before bringing it to others. It tells us that tonight there is tremendous and magnificent exchange. **John the Monk**, an 8th century writer, in his ***Hymn of the Nativity***, sings of this great exchange in the mystery and wonder of the Incarnation - God becoming man in order to bring man to heaven:

Heaven and earth are united today, for Christ is born! Today God has come upon earth, and humankind gone up to heaven. Today, for the sake of humankind, the invisible one is seen in the flesh. Therefore let us glorify him and cry aloud: glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace bestowed by your coming, Saviour: glory to you! Today in Bethlehem, I hear the angels: glory to God in the highest! Glory to him whose good pleasure it was that there be peace on earth! The Virgin is now more spacious than the heavens. Light has shone on those in darkness, exalting the lowly who sing like the angels: Glory to God in the highest! Beholding him [Adam] who was in God's image and likeness fallen through transgression, Jesus bowed the heavens and came down, without change taking up his dwelling in a virgin womb, that he might refashion Adam fallen in corruption, and crying out: glory to your epiphany, my Saviour and my God! [Stichera (hymn) of the Nativity of the Lord].

As we celebrate this great event in our lives, we remember and call to mind that the Birth of the Son of God was first announced, not to rulers and people of power, but to humble shepherds. It is a reminder to us that the acceptance of the Christmas story begins with a humble acceptance of all that God has done for us.

I would like to take this opportunity, on behalf of the Parish Team to wish you all a Blessed and Holy Christmas and a Christ filled New Year. May the Christ Child be welcomed into your homes and hearts, so that you may continue to announce his Good News to all by our way of living.

*A MESSAGE FOR Feast of The HOLY FAMILY of Jesus, Mary and Joseph.
31st December 2017*



Dear Friends,

Much is made in our society of the **'coming of age'** ceremony, with perhaps too much emphasis being placed on its celebration rather than on its significance. In the time of Jesus, a male entered manhood at the age of twelve. At that age he was expected to be obedient to all the elements of the Law of Moses and to do what was required faithfully and obediently.

One could imagine that this was a special time for Jesus as he was grappling with his identity and destiny. The key point of our Gospel passage today **[Luke 2:22-40]** occurs in the exchange between Mary and Simeon and Anna. Every parent has plans and hopes for their children, wondering and contemplating within their hearts what they hope the future will hold for their child. Will they be successful in what they choose? Will they struggle through life and its issues? These questions and concerns would have been further stressed considering the divine origins of Jesus' conception and birth. The news and reality of His birth came as a complete surprise to Mary and Joseph. You can imagine then their surprise and to a certain extent their apprehension, when they went to the Temple to go through the purification rituals demanded of mothers after the birth of their children and to present Jesus publicly in order to do to him what the Law demanded, and Simeon makes his prophecy to Mary and Joseph: **'This child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is opposed...'** **[Luke 2:34]**. Anna's prophecy would also have baffled Jesus' parents as she **'spoke of the child to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem'** **[Luke 2:38]**. These words would have remained with Mary and Joseph over the years when they nurtured Jesus to adult maturity. Luke reminds us that Jesus in his growing years was **'filled with wisdom'** **[Luke 2:40]**. The fact that Jesus was the Son of God made him the perfect son of his human parents. Truly godly people know that because they belong to God they discharge their duties with

supreme fidelity.

Our first and second readings remind us of what that duty entails, as members of Christian families. The reading from Ecclesiasticus **[3:2-6.12-14]**, from the Wisdom tradition, urges us to realise the mutual responsibility that should be present in any family that calls itself Christian. It mentions in particular the rewards that comes to the son who takes care of his father. We need to read this within the context of a patriarchal society, where the mother was taken care of by her father and brothers. In being faithful to that role the son 'amasses a fortune': happiness with his own children; his prayers will be heard; he will have long life.

The letter of Paul to the Colossians **[3:12—21]** again spells out how a Christian needs to relate to others, especially within the relationship of family. All this occurs – and needs to be lived out – because one is bearing the name of Christ. Paul does not simply say that one must do these things as a mere veneer – an outward show, but because this type of activity is conducive to being a Christian. One recognises a Christian by his or her's actions. What are those elements of behaviour? Paul lists them as follows:

***Clothed with sincere compassion,
In kindness and humility
Gentleness and patience;
Bear with one another;
Forgive one another as soon as a quarrel
begins.***

He extols us to keep alive the message of Christ in all its richness. In fact, he urges us to allow that message to find a home within us. Within the family context he has advice for all members: Wives should be obedient to their husbands as they are to the ways of the Lord; that husbands should love their wives and treat them with gentleness; that children should be obedient to their parents and that parents should not put overdue demands on their children. This sounds like solid advice that if taken and lived can allow a

Christian family unit to truly flourish because of its relationship with Christ. Truly godly people know that because they belong to God they discharge their duties with supreme fidelity. On this feast of the Holy Family I can ask myself: Am I aware of my Christian responsibilities within the family unit: socially and within the Church Family? Am I ready to promote the values that make up the Christian family within a society that seems to endanger its very existence?



WELCOME!

Here is a short history of our Cathedral.

There has been a centre of catholic worship in Parramatta since the early 1820s. The current sandstone building is the third St Patrick's Church completed on the site and was opened in 1936. When the Diocese of Parramatta was created in May 1986, St Patrick's Church became a Cathedral.

On 19th February 1996, the Cathedral was destroyed by fire, devastating the community but evoking an extraordinary feeling. "A new St Patrick's will rise from the ashes" was the catch cry, and so it proved to be. The beautiful Cathedral which you see before you was completed and dedicated on November 29, 2003.

The Cathedral precinct consists of the Chapel (the old Cathedral), the Cathedral (which is usually accessed via the Chapel), the Cloisters, Murphy House, the Cathedral Hall and the Cathedral Offices and Presbytery.



SACRAMENTS at ST PATRICK'S CATHEDRAL

Baptism

Baptisms are celebrated every Sunday throughout the year (other than in Lent) unless a Diocesan Function is taking place. Baptisms commence at **12.45pm** but families and guests must be present at the Cathedral by **12.30pm**. Highlighting the ecclesial dimension of the Sacrament at St Patrick's it is customary to baptise up to four children at each ceremony, highlighting the communal nature of the Sacrament.

To book a Baptism date and a place in the Parent Preparation Programme, please contact the Parish Office on (02) 8839 8400 during office hours Monday to Friday or email secretary@stpatscathedral.com.au. You may need to give several months notice as available places fill quickly.

RCIA

The Rite of Christian Initiation at St Patrick's Cathedral is conducted all year round. Interested people should be referred to the parish team. An initial interview is conducted and if appropriate the applicant is referred to the pre-catechumen group where a process of enquiry takes place. There is no time frame around any of the Steps. Movement through the process occurs after discernment between the coordinator and the enquirer.

Reception of the Sacraments of Initiation takes place either at the Easter Vigil or at another significant Feast of the Church Cycle. For further enquiries please contact the Parish Secretary on 8839 8400 or email deacon@stpatscathedral.com.au

INITIATION: FIRST HOLY COMMUNION and CONFIRMATION

Preparation for the Sacraments of Initiation for children already baptised is a parish-based family centred process.

The time to do this is when you observe that your young child is able to consistently 'discern' right from wrong. That is, that the child is able to reach an acceptance that the action performed, or not performed, was inappropriate and that the child is able to acknowledge this situation. Generally, most children reach this stage around the eighth year of age or the third year of schooling.

Here at St Patrick's Cathedral Parish the process of preparation begins around the second half of the year. Information sessions (Enquiry Time) are held at the parish, usually in the Cathedral Hall. These sessions provide the information parents need to continue the process of bringing the child to full initiation within the Faith Community. In May and June, the parish publishes notices when these gatherings will take place. For further enquiries please contact Meg on 0402 945 095 or email sacraments@stpatscathedral.com.au

The Cathedral is available for Catholic weddings. Couples are advised to make enquiries at least six months ahead of their intended nuptial to secure their preferred date and time.


