"If you remain in me..."

WE ALL DESIRE INTIMACY. Intimacy with others is essential for true happiness and fulfilment. God made us for one another and so it is not surprising that from time to time we seek the



company of others, perhaps often, perhaps occasionally. Conversely, we also need occasional solitude for good emotional health. This Sunday's Gospel reading from John is a profound reminder to us by Jesus of the great intimacy we are called to with him and the benefits which flow if we "remain in him."

We need to remember that John's Gospel is actually theology more than it is stories from the life of Jesus. Such stories are in John, of course, just as theology is found in the other Gospels, but stories are far fewer in number in John than they are in Matthew, Mark and Luke, often referred to as the "synoptic Gospels". John's theological bent is one of the key markers which differentiates it significantly from the synoptic Gospels. Jesus' words to us today give us a great deal of theology, telling us about the loving nature of God and our relationship with this loving God and God's people.

As he did in last Sunday's "Good Shepherd" Gospel, Jesus uses an image in this weekend's Gospel that was familiar to the people with whom he was speaking. This weekend we hear him refer to himself as a vine, with us as the branches. In one sense I believe this to be the most intimate and touching image of Jesus' relationship with us because we (the branches) are grafted onto, feed from and are reliant on Jesus (the vine). What could be more intimate? Another image which might be helpful to us is that of a baby being nursed by its mother. The intimacy between mother and child in this regard is unquestionable. Out of love for us, Jesus wants intimacy with us. Do we want it with him?

Of course, we have the freedom to say no to Jesus' invitation to intimacy. We may choose to say no out of fear. How often to people engage in shallow relationships with others out of fear of what greater intimacy may demand of them? Yet we need not fear intimacy with Jesus for it is only through a close attachment to Jesus (and I use the word 'attachment' deliberately in light of today's Gospel) that we will know true fulfilment and bear fruit.

There is however, a price to pay for this intimacy and Jesus doesn't hesitate to tell us what it is: we will be 'pruned'.

Just as a vine is pruned in order to bear a greater quantity of fruit, so we will know some difficulties and pain in our discipleship. Our response can be to simply give up and choose to detach from the vine, or to stay attached and see these trials as a necessary means to greater growth as a blessing. The choice is ours. Jesus never seeks to impose his will on us.

The words of Jesus this weekend sound to me rather like a plea: 'Make your home in me, as I make mine in you.' Let us respond positively to this invitation, safe in the knowledge that intimacy with Jesus, as a branch to the vine, is the only path to happiness both here on earth and in the world to come.

Reception of Communion

In light of a few comments I have made recently, I ask that you please take the following into consideration when receiving Communion:

- "Amen" (I believe) is said after the minister says "The Body of Christ" and before receiving the host. It needs to be audible to the minister.
- If receiving on the hand, please ensure that your hands are placed one under the other, and that the hand on top is slightly curved to ensure the host is secure. The host is then picked up with the bottom hand and placed into the mouth **before** moving back to your seat.
- If receiving on the tongue, please ensure that your head is kept still and your tongue is **fully** extended. Please **do not** crouch down towards the minister's hand. The minister can reach your tongue!

Saint of the Week

4th May - The English Martyrs

On 04 May 1535, at Tyburn in London, there died three Carthusian monks, the first of many martyrs of the English Reformation. Of these martyrs, 42 have been canonised, and a further 242 have been declared Blessed; but the true number of those who died on the scaffold, perished in prison, or were tortured or persecuted for their faith cannot now be reckoned. The persecution lasted 150 years and left a permanent mark on English culture: to this day Catholics continue to suffer certain minor disabilities under English law.



The martyrs celebrated today came from every walk of life. There were rich and poor, married and single, men and women. They are remembered for the example they gave of constancy in their faith and courage in the face of persecution.

Also on this day, as of 2001, are celebrated the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales who were canonised in 1970, including Saints Cuthbert Mayne, John Houghton and Edmund Campion (pictured).

DID YOU KNOW...


.....that when the priest washes his hands just before beginning the Eucharistic Prayer, it is not because they are dirty?

The rinsing of the priest's hands at this point of the Mass is a symbolic gesture. It parallels the rinsing rituals practised by people of other faiths such as Judaism and Islam. The priest quietly says, "Wash me, O Lord, from my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin." Both the basin used for this purpose and the ritual itself are referred to as the *lavabo*. The Latin word *lavabo* ("I shall wash") is the first word of Psalm 26 which is the psalm that the priest used to recite in earlier times during the *lavabo* ritual.

Jesus is the True Vine

Jesus says that He is the vine and we are the branches. Branches grow out from a vine and receive their food from the main stem. They grow leaves and bear fruit.



Our souls get their life from Jesus. When we stay united with Him then our souls are healthy and able to do good works, like the grapes that grow on a

healthy vine.

Doing a serious sin is like cutting oneself off of the main vine. The nutrition can't flow into the branch because it's cut off! The branch can't grow leaves or fruit and it withers and dries up. Even though you can't see it, that is what happens to a soul that doesn't have God's life coming into it.

Sometimes a branch of a vine needs to be pruned. A bit gets cut off, but then it grows even better where it was cut. In the same way, sometimes God lets us suffer, but then our souls can grow even stronger

and bear more good fruit. Next time you are suffering, remember that God might be using this time to make your soul stronger!
