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God's Ways = Life



I RECALL DURING MY STUDIES in the seminary attending a class on the Pentateuch. The Pentateuch consists of the first five books of the Hebrew Bible, namely Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy. Here we see the beginning of God's revelation to humanity as He seeks to restore mankind to its original design; perfect communion with Himself. The accounts of the Pentateuch are remarkable; it shows the growing relationship between God and humanity, the lives of the Patriarchs and their families, and the awesome power of God on full display. One thing however that irked me during this subject was the attitude of the Israelites during their escape from Egypt till their eventual judgement to wander the desert for forty years. I couldn't fathom how a people who had witnessed the incredible power of God topple the might of the Egyptian Empire could so easily fall away. How could they witness the parting of the Red Sea and quickly turn to worship a metal calf? The short answer is human weakness. We, just like the Israelites, are so easily swayed by the trappings of the world that we can easily lose sight of the Lord. Which is the reason why God's chosen instrument, Moses at that time, is so hard on the Israelites. 'Now, Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life,' Moses exclaims to the people.

The commandments of God are not concerned with restricting human freedom, in fact it is the opposite. God's law *is* about freedom. It enables us to live a life of human flourishing, a life free from sin that traps us in our selfish desires. In our Gospel this weekend, Christ speaks of the evil intentions that come from the human heart: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. Each of these concerns the individual. One is trapped within one's ego that he or she is no longer free to flourish. There is no freedom, only imprisonment. The only way forward is to cling to the commandments of God, to live according to his precepts for that is where we will have life.

Dear friends, on this Social Justice Sunday may we cling, not to human traditions, but to the commandments of God. In this way we exercise the charity of God not only to ourselves but to our neighbour. Social justice is concerned with the other. As such its foundation is rooted in love. This love is not just an idea but is made manifest in the Crucified Christ. May we recognise that it is in Christ that we have life. As the Psalmist says: 'Turn my eyes from looking at vanities, give me life in your ways.' (Psalm 119:37)



Saint of the Week

3rd September - St Gregory the Great (540-604)

Gregory was born in Rome in 540 and followed the career of public service that was usual for the son of an aristocratic family, finally becoming Prefect of the City of Rome, a post he held for some years. He founded a monastery in Rome and some in Sicily, then became a monk himself.

He was elected Pope on 03 September 590, the first monk to be elected to this office. He reformed the administration of the Church's estates and devoted the resulting surplus to the assistance of the poor and the ransoming of prisoners. He kept the Church's position secure by cultivating good relations with the tribes of barbarians. Amongst his memorable acts was the sending of Augustine and monks as missionaries to England in 596. He wrote extensively on pastoral care, spirituality and morals, and designated himself "servant of the servants of God." He died in 604.

NEWS FROM ROME



Pope Francis: 'Dear brothers and sisters, in our continuing catechesis on the Letter to the Galatians, we have seen how Paul teaches that those living in the grace of Christ are set free from the demands of the Mosaic Law. Today we consider Paul's claim that he had reprimanded Saint Peter in this regard. Peter had taken meals with Gentile Christians, but ceased to do so when a group of circumcised Christians arrived from Jerusalem. For Paul, this was a form of "hypocrisy" (*Gal* 2:13) that caused division in the community. All hypocrisy is born of a fear that holds us back from speaking the full truth; it leads to a life of pretence, where we say one thing but do another. Hypocrisy spreads like a virus. We find it often in our workplaces, in political life and, most detestably, in the Church itself. Jesus told us to let our "yes" be "yes" and our "no" be "no" (cf. *Mt* 5:37). To act otherwise is to jeopardise the very unity within the Church for which the Lord himself prayed.'
