Do you have a problem with problems?



THE DISCIPLES IN ST MARK'S GOSPEL certainly did! After James and John asked a favour from Jesus for a special place in the Kingdom of God, Mark tells us that the other disciples "became indignant at James and John" because of their forwardness and their desire to be superior to the others. We are talking about the Twelve Apostles here. We are talking about the pillars of the Church, the men that Jesus himself, the Son of God, chose specifically to be his closest companions and key messengers. And here we see them squabbling among themselves, infighting, having petty and self-absorbed reactions towards each other. The apostles' problem was that for the third time on their journey from Galilee to Jerusalem, Jesus predicted his passion and the kind of Messiah he was going to be – the suffering servant who gives his life for many. Facing this problem, the apostles had a problem that they did not know how to solve, understand, or comprehend. As is always the case, human beings turn inwards rather than outwards to others and complain: "What about me?!" The apostles got angry, and they perceived the action of James and John as an unjust or unfair action. Jesus quickly reminded them that to solve their problem they need first to be a "slave to all."

If this happened among the Twelve, I am not surprised that it happens among us, among the leaders of the Church today, among the people at our parish and in our apostolates. Jesus does not have a problem with the flaws of his followers, so why do we so often have a problem with them? Why do we become indignant when a pastor makes a choice with which we disagree? Why do we become indignant when our bishop doesn't do what we think he should do? Why do we become indignant and hypercritical so easily? Jesus does not have a problem with problems; he works through them to advance his Kingdom.

During the first Plenary Council assembly, the theme of listening to the Holy Spirit was constantly mentioned and practised by the delegates. I have no doubt that the first step for any personal 'conversion' and growth in our faith, is to listen. "Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?" Perhaps the answer is "yes", when we become part of the solution for the problem, not an obstacle. Or when we engage in constructive discussions with people of different views from ours. Or when we hold back our opinions to listen to the cry of the poor or the marginalised first! The model of Jesus presented to us today, is not one of ambition, power, and self-centredness but of one who did not come to be served but to serve. Let us prayerfully reflect and listen to the Word of Jesus in the Gospel, on why we so often have problems with problems.

Wishing you a blessed week ahead as we re-open!

Good News At Last!

As I write this early Friday afternoon, it seems almost certain that the vaccination rate for Greater Sydney will reach the 80% threshold sometime over the weekend. This means that churches and other places of worship will be able to open their doors once more to congregations for regular worship. This is terrific news, the news we've all been waiting for, and it seems likely that we will be able to open up to our **regular Mass schedule as of Monday, 18 October, though this will be confirmed during the announcements at Mass this weekend.**

Should we be able to open as of Monday, there will be the usual two Masses on weekdays (6:30am and 12:30pm) along with Reconciliation from 11:15am to 12:15pm. Please be aware that there will **still be some restrictions in place**, similar to earlier ones, such as mask wearing and social distancing, signing/checking in, and so on. Please respect all of these requirements to ensure that we can all safely worship together publicly once more.

I understand, of course, that some people, especially the elderly and vulnerable, will be hesitant to return to Mass for a while, especially in this early phase of reopening. This being so, we will still be livestreaming weekday and Sunday Masses as we have been, including the 11:00am Solemn Sunday Mass. This is likely to continue for quite a few weeks yet.

Thank you for your patience and prayers over the past few months. It has been a difficult time for everyone, certainly some more than others, but let us hope that this period of difficulty, frustration and struggle will lead to a greater appreciation of the precious gifts that God has given us in the Mass and, equally importantly, in each other, a truth which will be self-evident as we gather once more as sisters and brothers in Christ in our beautiful cathedral .



Saint of the Week

19th October - St Paul of the Cross (1694 - 1775)

Paul was born at Ovada in Liguria, Italy, in 1694. As a young man he helped his father, who was a merchant. He aspired to a perfect life, abandoned all his possessions and started to live in the service of the poor and sick. He gathered companions to help him in the task.



He became a priest and worked more and more for the salvation of souls. He set up houses for his congregation (the Passionists) and devoted himself to apostolic labours. He inflicted harsh penances on himself. Paul died at Rome on 18 October 1775.

NEWS FROM ROME



Pope Francis spoke this week to political leaders in the lead-up to the UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow next month: "...we appeal to governments to adopt without delay a course of action that would limit the average global temperature rise and to take courageous steps, including the strengthening of international cooperation. Specifically, we appeal to them to promote a transition towards clean energy; to adopt sustainable land use practices, preventing deforestation and restoring forests, conserving biodiversity, favouring food systems that are environmentally friendly and respectful of local cultures, working to end hunger and malnutrition, and to promote sustainable lifestyles and patterns of consumption and production.

"This means a transition towards a more integral and inclusive model of development, one grounded in solidarity and responsibility, whose effects on the world of work will also have to be taken into careful consideration.

"To meet this challenge, everyone has a role to play. That of political and government leaders is especially important, and indeed crucial. This demanding change of direction will require great wisdom, foresight and concern for the common good: in a word, the fundamental virtues of good politics."

A reading from the homilies of St Basil the Great (330-379)

“On Charity”

“Imitate the earth; produce fruit like her, so that you will not seem inferior to inanimate matter. For the earth has nourished her crops with no intention of enjoying them herself but to serve you. But whatever fruit of charity you may produce, you harvest for yourself, for the grace and reward of good works return to those who do them. You have given to the hungry. And what you gave becomes yours, and it returns to you with interest. As the corn which falls upon the earth yields a reward to the sower, so in the same way the bread given to a hungry man will bring you much reward hereafter. Therefore in your case, let the end of agriculture be the beginning of the heavenly sowing: ‘Sow for yourselves with an eye to righteousness.’”

Basil was born in 330 at Caesarea in Cappadocia (modern Turkey), of a Christian family. A brilliant scholar and a virtuous man, he started by becoming a hermit but was made bishop of Caesarea in 370. He fought against the Arians (an heretical group) and wrote many notable works, in particular the monastic rule which bears his name and which many monks in the East follow to this day. He was also generous to the poor. He had a brother, also a saint, Gregory (of Nyssa). Other family members are also recognised as saints. He died on 01 January 379.


...that this Sunday, 17 October, is the Faiths 4 Climate Justice Global Day of Action?


