'She has put in everything she possessed...'

AS A PRIEST, I have a somewhat privileged life. I don't have to worry about accommodation, where my next meal is coming from, nor do I have any worries about job security. I have no concerns about providing for a family and, connected with that, I don't have to deal with the usual issues that beset most families, including headaches that children inevitably bring, especially in their teenaged years! Having said all that, it was not a vocation I took up in order to take advantage of any perceived privileges. Just as life as it is lived by most people outside a religious vocation has its struggles, so too does priesthood. Anyone who chooses to be a priest or a religious solely for the temporal benefits it may bestow upon them is clearly motivated by a sense of entitlement.

It is this attitude that Jesus condemns in the Gospel this weekend. Jesus is in Jerusalem and we encounter him not too long before his passion and death. He observes the scribes and notes that they are concerned less, if at all, with religious activity directed toward God and God's people than they are with their own sense of importance and the feeding of their egos. In light of the marginalised position in society that many widows in Jesus' time endured, the reference to widows and the scribes' "swallowing of their property" only serves to underscore how irreligious Jesus perceives this group to be.

This attitude contrasts sharply with that of the widow Jesus observes in the encounter that immediately follows. We observe the widow putting two small coins (traditionally referred to as the "widow's mite") into the treasury, "everything she possessed'. She is contrasted too with those who put in a lot more money, but who clearly have a lot more wealth from which to give. A good analogy might be as follows: if you have too much food on your plate and so cannot possibly eat it all, there is no great merit in giving what you cannot eat to someone who is hungry. You are simply giving of your excess – you are not diminished in any way. If, on the other hand, you yourself are hungry and have less on your plate than what is needed to satisfy your hunger, there is great merit and virtue in giving of what little you have and need to someone else who, like you, is hungry.

The widow is presented to us as an example of someone who was not only generous but, more importantly, had great faith and trust in God. She clearly believed that despite giving away all her money, God would somehow provide for her. Her focus, unlike that of the scribes, was not on herself but on God. Her little gift was not going to change God but would continue to change her into someone more God-like.

This giving is a great example to us. I speak here not just of giving money but also giving of our time and talents to others for the sake of the building of the kingdom. Giving that involves sacrifice, that hurts a little, as a sign of faith and trust in God, is the sort of giving that not only emulates that of the widow but even more importantly of the one who made the ultimate sacrifice by giving himself totally and unreservedly for us – Jesus.

SYNOD 2021-2023

In his homily to open the journey of the Synod of Bishops, Pope Francis called to mind the rich young man who desired to follow Jesus. As avid readers of the scriptures we are well aware of this account. The rich young man approaches Jesus, impresses him with his devotion to the law but walks away in sadness following Christ's call to renounce all earthly attachments. To follow Christ requires a process of self-emptying. Yet Pope Francis tackles this particular account from another angle, he focuses on the very first line of the Gospel 'Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him.' Why this particular line? Pope Francis shows that Christ is always journeying, moving from one place to another yet continues to avail himself to all. Along his journey he encounters many (all with ranging issues) whom he never turns away. Jesus encounters, listens and discerns. Take the rich young man; Jesus, being the Incarnate Word, knew exactly what this man needed. Yet he didn't jump to conclusions, he conversed with the young man, seeking to draw him into the heart of the Father. This journeying process is the hallmark of the Synodal process the Pope calls the faithful to. I ask you to continue to pray for this process.

Deacon Rod Pirotta - Farewell!




Parish Picnic



Saint of the Week

11th November - St Martin of Tours (c.316-397)

Martin was born in the Roman province of Pannonia (approximating to the western half of modern Hungary) in about 316 and was educated at Pavia in Italy. He was baptised, left the army and after spending some time as a hermit on an island off the Ligurian coast, founded a monastery at Ligugé in western France, where he lived a monastic life guided by St Hilary. Later he was ordained priest and became bishop of Tours. In his actions he gave an example of what a good shepherd should be. He found other monasteries, educated the clergy, and preached the Gospel to the poor. He died in 397.

The famous story about St Martin is that while a soldier in Amiens, he gave half of his military cloak to a beggar and later had a dream in which the beggar revealed himself as Christ.

NEWS FROM ROME

Beginning of the message of Pope Francis to the COP26 Conference in Glasgow: 'As the Glasgow Conference begins, all of us are aware that it has the vital task of demonstrating to the entire international community whether there really exists a political will to devote – with honesty,

responsibility and courage – greater human, financial and technological resources to mitigating the negative effects of climate change and assisting the poorer and more vulnerable nations most affected by it.

'At the same time, we realize that this task has to be undertaken in the midst of a pandemic that for almost two years has devastated our human family. Covid-19 has brought immense tragedies in its wake, but it has also taught us that, if we are to succeed in overcoming the pandemic, there is no alternative: all of us must play a part in responding to this challenge. And that, as we know, calls for profound solidarity and fraternal cooperation between the world's peoples.'

Living Laudato Si'

As you are aware, Pope Francis has issued several encyclicals since the beginning of his pontificate and all of them have created a buzz of some sort. His 2015 encyclical letter "Laudato Si" with the subtitle "On Care for Our Common Home" is focused, as the subtitle suggests, on our relationship with creation. With this encyclical, Pope Francis made it clear that he considers this relationship to be of prime importance and, indeed, it has become somewhat of a feature of his pontificate. The Australian Bishops' Social Justice Statement for 2021-2022, "Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor" uses Laudato Si' as the basis for its ideas, putting Pope Francis' concerns into an Australian context.

Over the next few weeks, this space will be devoted to looking at how we can put the concerns of Pope Francis and the Australian bishops into action in our day-to-day

living. Encyclicals and social justice statements are all good and well but they remain fruitless unless we put their ideas into action. Five areas of daily living will be covered: appreciating the natural environment, food, transport, waste and children.

Let us see what we can do as a people of faith to action Laudato Si' and help make the world one which shows we are good stewards of God's creation, especially as the world leaders conclude their gathering in Glasgow with the aim of taking bold action to mitigate climate change.

DID YOU KNOW...


...that the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was the idea of a British World War One chaplain?


