CONNECT WITH OUR PARISH!

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Advent: more than preparing for a baby...

THE WORD "ADVENT" is by no means particular to Christianity. It means an important arrival. We might say, for example, "We are awaiting the advent of summer." The word "Advent", with a capital "A" is, however, particular to our Christian faith as it indicates the most important arrival of all, that of Christ into our world for the sake of our salvation.



It is no coincidence therefore that the season of Advent occupies the four weeks or so leading up to Christmas, the celebration of the Nativity, the birth of Jesus. Yet if Advent is solely about preparing for the celebration of the birth of Jesus, how to explain the Gospel reading on this First Sunday of Advent which seems to differ little from that of a couple of Sundays ago (14 November) which focused on the end of the world as we know it? Take, for example, the words of Jesus from the Gospel of Mark from that Sunday: "In those days...the sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness, the stars will come falling from heaven and the powers in the heavens will be shaken." Compare those words with the words of Jesus from Luke's Gospel this Sunday: "There will be signs in the sun and moon and stars; on earth nations in agony, bewildered by the clamour of the ocean and its waves; men dying of fear as they await what menaces the world; for the powers of heaven will be shaken."

There seems to be something amiss here. Apocalyptic images of the end of the world abound yet no mention of a cute baby lying peacefully in a manger, dotingly looked upon by Mary and Joseph along with some docile farmyard animals. How to explain this apparent conflict of ideas?

Advent is more than awaiting the celebration of the birth of Jesus, his "First Coming". The placing of Advent in our Church calendar in the lead-up to Christmas might blind us to the understanding that there is more than one coming of Christ into the world – there are, in fact, three, and these three "advents" are taken up more or less in the three readings before us this Sunday.

The First Coming of Jesus, his birth, is the easiest and least confronting of the three comings of Jesus. We are all familiar with the image of a placid baby in the manger, sweetly looking up at those gazing on him. This First Coming marks the beginning of our salvation and so we rejoice in this event at Christmas.

The Second Coming of Jesus is that which will happen at the end of time, the focus of our Gospel passage this weekend. Much has been written and said about the return of Jesus at the end of time but as we heard a couple of Sundays ago, not even Jesus knows when this will be. We must be prepared for this event at all times.

The Third Coming of Jesus is related to us in the Second Reading this weekend. The Third Coming is essentially the here and now because we believe that Jesus has never left us. Our lives as people of faith are a direct response to the continuing presence of Jesus in our world. When we make bad choices we are ignoring the presence of Christ in another person or situation; by contrast, a good choice is an acknowledgement of Christ's presence. We must remember that it is the way we live now in relation to this ongoing "Third Coming" of Christ that will determine how we stand at the advent of the "Second Coming" of Jesus at the end of time.





Saints of the Week

3rd December - St Francis Xavier (1506-1552), Priest

Francis was born in the Basque country of Spain in 1506. He met Ignatius Loyola, the founder of the Jesuits, when he was a student in Paris, and he was ordained priest in 1537. In 1541 the Pope sent him as part of a mission to India, and he spent the rest of his life in the East, preaching the Gospel in Goa and Malacca. He made many converts and fought against the exploitation of the native population by the Europeans. Francis spent two years on a successful mission to Japan, laying the foundations of many Christian communities; and in 1552, after entering China secretly to preach the Gospel there, he died of fever and exhaustion on the Chinese island of Shanghwan.

NEWS FROM ROME



"Dear Brothers and Sisters: In our continuing catechesis on Saint Joseph, we now consider his important role in salvation history. The genealogies in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke present Jesus as the "son of Joseph" (Lk 3:23), and affirm that, while not his biological father, Joseph nevertheless exercises a true fatherhood in his regard. Matthew shows that Joseph, though an apparently marginal figure, is in fact central to the unfolding of salvation history and the fulfilment of God's promises. This reminds us that we too are called to play our own part, however small, in spreading the saving message of the Gospel. Luke portrays Joseph as the protector of Jesus and Mary. He likewise carries on this role as Protector of the Universal Church, the continuation of the Body of Christ in history. The genealogy of Joseph also reminds our often fractured world of the importance of the human ties that precede and follow us. As we seek to strengthen those ties, and protect our vulnerable brothers and sisters through fraternal works of charity, let us trust in Joseph's prayers and imitate his humble and loyal role in God's plan of salvation."

Living Laudato Si' - TRANSPORT

Shipping containers have been used for the past few decades as a key form of international transport. Approximately 90% of goods moved internally are moved via shipping containers. The remaining 10% are moved by air freight. Again, like workers in food production, cargo logistics workers are often invisible but key to the functioning of our global economy, only receiving prominence when stress events like pandemics upend supply chains. Crews on container vessels work long hours, often in dangerous conditions both mid-ocean and alongside in container ports. Many of these workers come from third world countries, spend most of their work lives on vessels with minimal opportunity for shore leave during port visits and can have months between visits to their families in their home countries. Australian charities such as Stella Maris and the Mission to Seafarers offer welfare support to international sea crews during visits to Australian ports.

Whether transport occurs via sea or air, resources are expended in the form of fuel. Again, like the workers in the food and transport industries when considering a response to matters raised in Laudato Si, there are overlays between food and transport regarding food miles, the resource footprint taken to get the food from point of production to the point of sale. A couple of examples are: asparagus in October and cherries in November are locally produced, as compared to March (asparagus) and June (cherries), when these foodstuffs are airfreighted from overseas. Other items such as rice, pasta, canned fruit, tomatoes and legumes have options both produced in Australia plus imported by sea freight containers.

A response to Laudato Si can be to reflect on our personal transport modes. What is the mix of transport usage in our own lives across private vehicle, public transport versus more active forms of walking or riding where this is possible? Could I consider trying to decrease private car usage, even by one journey a week, to another form that uses less resources?

I was instituted as an Acolyte and have served during masses on weekends and weekdays. On a few occasions I administered communion to the aged in a nursing home.


