Radical Love

THROUGHOUT MY YEARS in the seminary I made it a priority to attend as many ordinations, diaconal or priestly, as I could. With the rigorous grind of priestly formation, at times the seminary would feel like an eternity. Ordinations thus served as a joyful reminder of



the light at the end of the tunnel. On one occasion I attended a priestly ordination at St. Mary's Cathedral. The church was filled to capacity as three young deacons were ordained priests of Jesus Christ. As the ordination came to a close the youngest of the new priests gave a note of gratitude to the Bishop and the congregation. 'Praised be Jesus Christ and his most Holy Mother,' he declared. 'On this most joyful day, my brother priests and I have been called and sent out to love in a radical way.' On hearing this I was immediately taken aback. Radical love? What is radical love? The young priest continued, 'We are sent on mission to imitate Christ in our lives and present Him in all that we do.' The imitation of Christ, for the young priest, is the radical love he spoke of. But in what sense is the imitation of Christ 'radical'?

Our Gospel for this Sunday presents a very interesting teaching from Christ. Speaking to his disciples, Christ instructs them to 'Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly. To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too.' His teaching astounds the crowd as it opposes the secular gospel - to love your friends and hate your enemies. How can one love one's enemies? As difficult as it is, Christ paves the way for us. He shows us that it is possible to exercise charity in this radical way. We recall during his crucifixion the soldiers both mocking and cursing Jesus. The Pharisees too looked on as the thorn in their side slowly dies. Yet did Christ retaliate in response to their taunts? Did Christ strike them down in vengeance? No, Christ prayed to the Father for their forgiveness. He sought their salvation despite their sins. He exercised charity beyond belief as it sought the well-being of his transgressors. That, dear friends, is the radical love we are called to.

Dear friends, like the disciples we are called and challenged by Christ to exercise his radical love in the world. How do we treat those who transgress against us? Do we continue to harbour ill feelings towards them? Do we seek their destruction in our thoughts? If the answer is yes then we must change that. May I suggest praying for those who hurt us? It may seem strange but by this action we invite Christ into our wounds. He will inspire change in our lives so that we emulate the Father's love in our hearts. I'll end with the beautiful words of our Lord,

'I give you a new commandment; love one another as I have loved you.'



Saint of the Week

23rd February - St Polycarp (died c.155), Bishop, Martyr

Polycarp was a disciple of the Apostles, bishop of Smyrna (modern-day Izmir in western Turkey), and a friend of St Ignatius of Antioch. He went to Rome to confer with Pope Anicetus about the celebration of Easter. He was martyred at Smyrna in about 155 by being burnt to death in the stadium. Polycarp is an important figure in the history of the Church because he is one of the earliest Christians whose writings still survive. He bears witness to the beliefs of the early Christians and the early stages of the development of doctrine.

NEWS FROM ROME

From the Pope's General Audience on 16 February:

'Nowadays it is common, it is an everyday occurrence, to criticise the Church, to point out its inconsistencies — there are many — to point out its sins, which in reality are our

inconsistencies, our sins, because the Church has always been a people of sinners who encounter God's mercy. Let us ask ourselves if, in our hearts, we love the Church as she is, the People of God on the journey, with many limitations, but with a great desire to serve and to love God. In fact, only love makes us capable of speaking the truth fully, in a non-partisan way; of saying what is wrong, but also of recognising all the goodness and holiness that are present in the Church, starting precisely with Jesus and Mary. Loving the Church, safeguarding the Church and walking with the Church. But the Church is not that little group that is close to the priest and commands everyone, no. The Church is everyone, everyone. On the journey. Safeguarding one another, looking out for each other.'


