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Triumph...then desolation

AND SO the drama begins...

Jesus enters Jerusalem for the final time. Having entered the city he celebrates the Passover with his disciples, then experiences the agony of Gethsemane, and finally his arrest, trial and the agonising execution normally reserved for the worst of criminals. We better know this as his Passion.

And this is why the more correct term for Palm Sunday is "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord". This weekend we recall Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, with the common people greeting Jesus joyfully, laying their cloaks on the road along with "greenery which they had cut in the fields", as a sign of respect. But this Gospel which we hear at the beginning of Mass is one of two proclaimed on Palm Sunday. The second, of course, is that of the Passion. We not only recall Jesus entering Jerusalem this weekend at the start of Holy Week, we also fast-forward to the outcome of his action. We recall these events in greater detail on Holy Thursday and Good Friday but get a foretaste today. We can't afford to revel as the people did when Jesus rode astride the colt into the great city, for unlike the crowds, we know the rest of the drama. Our joyful celebrations will begin once the Passion is over and Jesus rises from the dead.

The crowds greeting Jesus will soon fall silent. The one who enters Jerusalem as a king will show that he is not a normal king, not the king that the common people were expecting. A normal king would summon armies to mow down those who dare to treat him with such a lack of respect but this king maintains a dignified silence throughout most of the drama that befalls him. The frenetic activity happens around Jesus as he stands still, only uttering words when necessary. This king is not going to lower himself to the level of his torturers and accusers. This king understands the power of choosing not to seek revenge on his persecutors but rather seeking to bring about a change of heart in them through the power of love. This king, after all, is God.

As we gather for this Palm Sunday celebration let us make a choice to enter into Holy Week with an open heart that we may know the power of silence over angry words, of peace over clenched fist, of love over vengeance. Lent has given us an opportunity to be open to conversion - Holy Week affords us the chance to intensify that experience as we live out the drama that is the Passion of the Christ in a few short days' time.

We move quickly today from "Hosanna!" to "My God, my God, why have you deserted me?" Triumph to desolation.... Or so it would seem.

We await the final and ultimate triumph, the Resurrection, with keen anticipation and great joy.

Saint of the Week

11th April - St Stanislaus (1030-1079), Bishop, Martyr

Stanislaus was born in Szczepanów, Poland, in about 1036. He studied at Liège, was ordained, and in 1072 became bishop of Kraków. He ruled the church as a good shepherd, gave help to the poor, and performed annual visitations to supervise the clergy. Stanislaus reproached King Bolesław II for his crimes and vices and at length excommunicated him. Bolesław sought him out, and murdered Stanislaus as he was celebrating Mass on 08 May 1079.

Pope Francis' Words...

General Audience: 06 April 2022



Last Saturday and Sunday I travelled to Malta: an Apostolic Journey that had been planned for quite some time. It was postponed two years ago due to Covid and these things. Not many people know about Malta, even though it is an island in the middle of the Mediterranean. It received the Gospel very early. Why? Because the Apostle Paul was shipwrecked near its coasts and miraculously saved himself along with all those on the ship with him – more than two hundred and seventy people. The book of the Acts of the Apostles recounts that the Maltese welcomed all of them, and uses this word: "with unusual kindness" (28:2). I chose these very words – *with unusual kindness* – as the motto of my Journey because they indicate the path to follow, not only to face the phenomenon of migrants, but more generally, so that the world might become more fraternal, more liveable, and might be saved from a "shipwreck" that menaces all of us. For we are all – as we have learned – in the same boat, all of us. Viewed from that horizon, Malta is a *key-place*.

Easter, chocolate.....and modern slavery?

Chocolate is a very delicious food and Australians consume and gift millions of dollars of chocolate products during the Easter season. Many of us are unaware of the links between chocolate production and modern slavery due to much West African cocoa bean production being performed by children forced into labour. Below are some areas for potential reflection, research and action:

DID YOU KNOW...

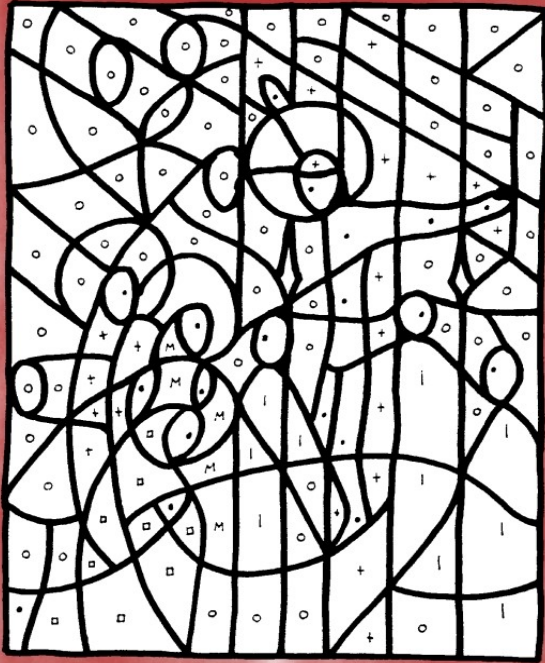
...that the Gospel passages that tell of Jesus entering Jerusalem that we hear on Palm Sunday do not specifically mention palms?

In fact, in Luke's version of this Gospel, the one we hear this weekend, there is no mention of the crowds placing anything on the road Jesus was taking except that they "spread their garments on the road." Matthew and Mark both mention the crowds spreading garments in the path of Jesus. These two Gospels also talk of the people cutting branches and spreading them before Jesus, but no mention in particular of palms. We can only assume that because palms are so common in the Middle East, these were the types of branches cast before Jesus as he entered the Holy City. In any case, it is the gesture that counts!

Holy Week

Today is the beginning of Holy Week, when we specially remember the last days of Jesus and His death on the cross.

The Sunday before Jesus died, He came riding into Jerusalem on a donkey. All the people cheered for Him. They laid down their cloaks and palm branches on the road to honour Him. That was Palm Sunday.

On the first Holy Thursday Jesus offered the first Mass ever. He took bread and wine and changed them into His Body and Blood and gave them to His Apostles to eat and drink. The same thing happens at every Mass when the priest says Jesus' words at the Consecration. We don't see the bread or wine change, but they are still really Jesus, offering Himself to God for us.

Good Friday is the day that Jesus died on the cross. The leaders of the Jews got the people to turn against Him. After an unfair trial, Jesus was whipped harshly and made to carry a cross up a hill. Then He was nailed to the cross and hung there until He died. Only His mother and a few of His friends were with Him.

Jesus was God and could have stopped the people from killing Him, but He chose to die for you. Because we sin, we don't deserve to go to Heaven. Jesus died to take the punishment for our sins so that we could go to Heaven. That's why it's called "Good" Friday! What is something special you can do on Good Friday to make up for your sins and say "thank you" to Jesus?

On Good Friday morning, JESUS, who had been arrested the night before, was judged by Pontius Pilate, the ROMAN governor. Pilate had him WHIPPED. Then to make fun of Him the SOLDIERS made a CROWN of THORNS and put it on His head. They threw a purple cloth on Him and beat Him with RODS, saying, "Hail, KING of the JEWS!" Then Pilate had Jesus brought out in front of the people and asked them what they wanted to do with Him. The people, who had welcomed Him into JERUSALEM a few days before with their HOSANNAS, now shouted that He should be crucified.

So Jesus was made to CARRY a heavy CROSS out of the city and up a big HILL. Because He was so weak from being beaten, a man named SIMON of Cyrene was forced to help Him. The soldiers tore off Jesus' CLOTHES and attached Him to the cross with NAILS through His hands and feet.

Jesus offered His life for our SINS. He hung on the cross for three HOURS until He DIED. Nearby were His mother MARY, JOHN the Apostle, and Mary MAGDALEN. After He died a soldier stuck a SPEAR into His side to be sure He was dead.

Did you know that at every MASS we re-offer Jesus' sacrifice on the cross in an unbloody way on the altar?



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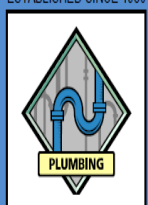
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
