“...be on your guard against avarice...”



“VANITY OF VANITIES. ALL IS VANITY!” is one of the more enigmatic and misunderstood phrases in the Hebrew scriptures. Once again, we encounter the problem of translation: a word is used which is understood in a particular way in the modern era whereas in the past it was understood more broadly, to say nothing of whether the word “vanity” is the best translation of the Hebrew word “hevel”. On hearing the word “vanity” we immediately think of excessive pride, whereas in the context of today’s First Reading it means futility or worthlessness. King Solomon is conveying his belief that all on earth is futile, including, most particularly, human labour.

The link with the Gospel is clear. Jesus makes the point in two ways: firstly, by refusing the request of a man in the crowd to have his brother give the man his share of their inheritance; secondly, through illustrating with a parable his point about the futility of storing up material wealth. Jesus understands that the problem with material wealth is that the one who accumulates it never has enough, just as someone with an addiction never feels satisfied. The futility is illustrated by the fact that the wealthy man in the parable will never have the use of his stored goods for he will shortly die and his goods given to another. He would have done better to have used his prodigious wealth to relieve the sufferings of others, and so invested in what lies beyond death.

Of course, it’s very easy to take potshots at the wealthy. Though Jesus speaks of a wealthy man in the parable, this is not to say that only the affluent are prone to avarice. Those who have little are sometimes of the same mentality as the rich man of the parable, guarding what they have jealously and not being willing to share when they can, whilst some who are well off share generously with little or no concern about guarding all they own.

It’s not just the lure of wealth which we need to be on guard against: power, influence and popularity are equally insidious. Pursuing these blindly for their own sake is rather like building an elaborate sand sculpture on a beach as the tide comes in: we might build something magnificent and worthy of admiration, but it is all for naught as it will inevitably be destroyed.

Let us pray this weekend that we will have the wisdom to take the words of Jesus to heart. May we understand that whilst receiving something may bring some short-term happiness, real and lasting happiness comes with giving to benefit others. Seeking to accumulate wealth, power or influence primarily as a means of securing our future or bolstering our sense of self-worth is a recipe for disaster, not only here and now, since it brings only anxiety and stress, but it jeopardises our future beyond this life.

May we welcome material things as gifts from God and put them to use with one eye on their provider. Any other approach is futile or, as King Solomon would say, vanity. To quote St Basil the Great: “Now you are going to leave your money behind you here whether you like it or not, but on the other hand you will be taking with you to the Lord the credit obtained for your good works.”

Plenary Council Conclusions...

The assembly called for a return of the Third Form of the Rite of Penance and the revision of the current English translation of the Roman Missal. It affirmed the equality of women and called for their appointment to leadership bodies.

And motions related to the First Nations peoples and climate change were also quite positive signs.

But the Plenary Council and synodal moments are not just about the proposals that are passed. The Plenary Council is part of the synodal movement which is "the container" that's taking the Church forward. And this synodal structure is taking the Church forward.

Perhaps, looking at Australia, the Church has seen in this instance the limitations of a Plenary Council structure because it is hampered by a legal approach and may not best serve communal discernment.

Francis's use of synods (at the local, national, and universal level) seems a better option. But he will not be able to ignore what happened in Australia (and in Germany).

Geraldine Doogue, the noted commentator on Church affairs in Australia, said the Plenary Council made "progress" in her eyes.

"I have always had a rather blunt assessment of Plenary Council success, amid my rather demoralized Church. If it changes the laity's views about its own role in the Church of the future, it can mark itself as successful, whatever the qualifications," she wrote in *The Australian*.

"I think the verdict is in," Doogue concluded.

Just as important as this ecclesial event's final deliberations will be the process of its reception.

The Fifth Plenary Council for Australia will have to be studied historically. Judging it too quickly as a success or failure based on what it produced would be a materialistic downplaying of an ecclesial event which was unthinkable only ten years ago.

After the fourth and final session of Vatican II was brought to a conclusion on December 8, 1965, many key bishops and theological advisors at the Council said it was just the beginning of a beginning (for example, Karl Rahner), and that Vatican II was only about to start (Bernard Häring).

This is true also for what happened in Australia over the last few years and culminated in the Sydney assembly of July 2022.

The Fifth Plenary Council is over, but in some sense it begins now.







Saint of the Week

4th August - Saint John Mary Vianney (1786-1859)

Jean-Baptiste-Marie Vianney was the son of a peasant farmer, and a slow and unpromising candidate for the priesthood: he was eventually ordained on account of his devoutness rather than any achievement or promise.

In 1818 he was sent to the isolated village of Ars-en-Dombes, and remained there for the rest of his life because his parishioners would not let him leave. He was a noted preacher, and a celebrated confessor: such was his fame, and his reputation for insight into his penitents' souls and their futures, that he had to spend up to eighteen hours a day in the confessional, such was the demand. The tens of thousands of people who came to visit this obscure parish priest turned Ars into a place of pilgrimage.



...that Vocations Awareness Week begins next Sunday?





Jesus teaches us not to be greedy



In today's Gospel reading, a man tells Jesus that his brother is being unfair to him. But Jesus knows that the man is just being greedy, so He tells him the parable of the rich farmer. One year he had such a good harvest that he couldn't fit it all into his barns. He tore down his old barns and built new ones, so that he could store his food for many years. But just when he thought he would be able to rest and enjoy his food, God told him that he would die.

This parable is a warning against being greedy. Jesus is not saying that we should not save some food or that we shouldn't save our money. He is just telling us to remember that we are going to die one day, and then everything we saved is going to be useless for us. He wants us to use the things we have wisely, but not be too attached to them.



Think of something that is really special to you. How would you feel if you lost it or it was taken away? Do your feelings show that you care too much about things? Try to think of your belongings in such a way that if you lost them you wouldn't be too upset. After all, none of your stuff is going to matter to you when you die!
