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Living "in-between..."

WHEN YOU THINK about it, much of our life is spent between one thing and another. Put bluntly, our life as a whole is essentially what occurs between our birth and our death. As teenagers, we are between childhood and adulthood; we might spend some considerable time between one job and another, between one relationship and another, or feeling peckish between one meal and the next. Most people's lives are spent doing the comparatively mundane tasks that make up much of life between its intermittent, and perhaps rare, highs and lows.



As Christians, we are also in his "in-between" zone. We are living between the Incarnation, the "God-made-flesh" event of history that we celebrate in a few weeks' time, and the return of Christ at the end of time. There was no Christianity before the Incarnation and there will be none necessary when Christ returns. Seen like this, we are a very fortunate group of human beings, living in a privileged time in history. With that privilege, as with all privileges, there is an attendant responsibility.

On a sidenote, this weekend marks the beginning of the Advent season and the start of the new liturgical year, moving now to Year A in which our focus will be the Gospel of Matthew, written for a Jewish audience with Jesus being depicted as the new Moses. Our attention this weekend is not the beginning of the Gospel but rather somewhere towards the end as we hear Jesus speak of the coming of the Son of Man, reminding us to stay awake as we don't know when this event will happen.

Not knowing when Jesus will return means that our lives as disciples need to be constantly attuned to signs of Jesus' presence in the here and now. The return of Jesus at the end of time is popularly referred to as the "Second Coming", (with the "First Coming" being his birth in Bethlehem), but the problem with such language is that its logical conclusion is that Jesus is absent during this "in-between" time. Of course, nothing could be further from the truth. And as Christians, our responsibility, alluded to above, is to recognise Jesus' abiding presence in everyday living and respond to it accordingly.

Advent gives us the opportunity to reflect on this aspect of our faith a little more deeply. How do I understand the presence of Christ in my life? Am I able to recognise Christ's presence in contexts that aren't exclusively "religious"? Yes, I believe in the presence of Christ in the Eucharist, but do I emphasise this above and beyond Christ's presence in other people, in the scriptures, in the various circumstances that occur in my life, favourable and unfavourable? Do I seek not to engage with the divine here on earth because I am focused almost exclusively on the "world to come"? How do I understand the kingdom of God?

Over the next few weeks, in the lead-up to Christmas, we will hear of the mission of John the Baptist, the one who calls us to prepare a way for the Lord, to make way for Emmanuel, "God-is-with-us." If we truly believe God is with us, then let us ensure that we are not focused only on the past or what we wait for in hope, but on responding to God, here and now.

01 December - Blessed Clementine Anuarite

Nengepeta Anuarite was born in the Belgian Congo (now in North Zaire) on 29 November 1939. In 1955 she joined the Religious Institute of the "Holy Family" (Jamaa Takatifu) where she became known as Clementine. She trained as a primary school teacher and for a few years was the matron of a boarding school. In 1964 she, and the whole community, were kidnapped by the Simba rebels. Anuarite was killed on 01 December 1964 having refused to be the wife of the Colonel.

...that each of the candles on the Advent wreath has attributed to it a particular symbol or theme of Advent?




