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Praying for the Faithful Departed

BEING OUR FIRST Sunday Mass in November, the month of Holy Souls, it is very fitting that we hear about resurrection of the dead in both our First Reading and Gospel. Indeed, even our Second Reading (2 Thessalonians), usually having no thematic link to the First Reading and Gospel, has as its foundation the concern of the church in Thessalonica about the fate of those who have died.



For we Christians, belief in the resurrection of the dead is essentially what most distinguishes us from those who have no faith. People with no faith can still perform great acts of sacrifice, heroism, goodness and love, of course, and we see that regularly – charity is by no means restricted to the religious! What most distinguishes us as Christians is our belief in a distinct form of life after death, and the hope of attaining the Beatific Vision colours the manner in which we live our lives. This is not to say that our good deeds are undertaken as a means of "getting into heaven" but rather are a response to the love that God has shown us in Jesus, a love that does not cease at death.

And, of course, our love for those we have known who have died does not cease at their passing and so we pray for their souls in the hope that if they are not already dwelling in the light and love of God, they are on their way to God. November is the month is which we do this in a deeper and more collective way, praying not only for those we have known but others too, acknowledging our communion as the body of Christ.

But why pray for the dead? The Catechism (n.1032), quoting from 2 Maccabees, the same book that we hear from in this Sunday's First Reading, tells us that Judas Maccabeus "made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin." (12:46) Thus, there is a theological reason why we pray for the dead, that they might be purified in readiness to enter into heaven.

Another reason is simply this: what else can we do? Our love for someone who has died has to be expressed somehow, and so prayer is a very real way that we can nourish that connection between ourselves and the deceased, asking God to exercise his mercy over our loved ones, to cleanse them of their sins and various imperfections and receive them into his loving arms. Just as we think about and pray for absent friends who are still alive, so we think about and pray for those absent friends who we will not see again here on earth but hope to see and dwell with for eternity after our own earthly lives have ended.

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

Saint of the Week

12 November - St Josaphat, Bishop, Martyr

Josaphat was born in Ukraine of Orthodox parents in 1580. He lived in a time of religious turmoil with a schism within the Orthodox church. Josaphat joined a monastery in order to be in communion with Rome. He was ordained priest and, eventually and reluctantly, appointed bishop of Polotsk in 1617. The local aristocracy were against



any union with Rome as it weakened their control of religious matters and so stirred up trouble. As a result Josaphat was murdered by a mob in 1623 while on a pastoral visit to Vitebsk,

a city in modern-day Belarus. (Information taken from Universalis)

...that the Old Testament Books of Maccabees, from which we hear about prayers for the dead, were written not that long before the birth of Christ?




