Sentimentality and Salvation

AT THE RISK OF sounding like a wet blanket, if there is one thing I find difficult to swallow at Christmas, it is sentimentality with regards to the image of Jesus in the stable at Bethlehem, be it depicted in a manger scene in a department store (a much rarer event now than in years gone by!), in a church, or on a Christmas card. I'm not a fan of sentimentality in art regardless of the context, but when it comes to the scene of the Holy Family in the stable at Bethlehem, it makes me rather uneasy. Not all depictions of this famous image are sentimental, but many seem to be.



This is not, of course, to make a judgment on those who like such artistic depictions of the infant Jesus. Everyone is free to like or dislike whatever they please, taste in art being, as it is, subjective. I suppose that if any scene from the Gospels were to inspire sentimentality, that of Jesus as a baby is the natural choice. By comparison, the idea of sentimentalising Jesus on the cross would be distasteful. Having said that, sentimental images of the crucifixion are hardly unknown.

I feel that if anyone is to blame in this matter it is probably our Victorian-era forebears who developed this style to a large degree. It is no coincidence, I'm sure, that the Victorian era shaped the Christmas season to the way we know it today, with Christmas cards, sumptuous feasts and gift-giving all either invented or popularised throughout that time in history.

My distaste for sentimentality in the Bethlehem scene is more than an artistic issue – it is also one of faith. Put simply, there should be nothing sentimental about the birth of Jesus. It is the event which marks the beginning of our salvation; sentimentalising it reduces, maybe even eliminates, our appreciation of this earth-shattering episode in human history. Put simply, when we consider the idea of peace that a mawkish representation of the birth of Jesus conveys, we are forced to consider that Jesus, the Prince of Peace, was born in a time of great danger, a time of foreign occupation where death was lurking around every corner.

The peaceful scene of the baby Jesus in the stable at Bethlehem, traditionally gazed upon lovingly by not only Mary and Joseph but also a series of barnyard animals, has a flipside to it. This sweet little baby will grow to be a man who, for the sake of our salvation, will suffer the bloody and violent death of a common criminal at the hands of his enemies. We must remember, whether we are gazing at a sentimental representation of the Nativity scene or not, that it is only the beginning of a story, a story with a glorious ending, but not before the blood and gore that precede it – all out of love for us and a desire by God to bring us back into his favour.

May I take this opportunity on behalf of the clergy and staff of St Patrick's Cathedral, to wish you and your loved ones a blessed Christmas and abundance of God's blessings as we move into the New Year.

Saint of the Week

29 December - St Thomas Becket

Thomas was born in London in 1118 and became a close friend of King Henry II. He was only a deacon when he was appointed Chancellor of England. When he was ordained as Archbishop of Canterbury, he underwent an abrupt conversion of life and began to defend the Church's rights against the king. He had to take refuge in a French monastery for six years, and when he returned to his diocese four knights, inspired by careless words from the king, assassinated him in his cathedral on 29 December 1170. He was immediately acknowledged as a martyr and the king later did penance and endowed his shrine. He is remembered for his courage in defence of the rights of the Church.

Did You Know...

...that the Holy Innocents which we celebrate later this week on 28 December, are regarded as martyrs because they died *instead of* Christ, not *because of* Christ?

In the early days of the Church, the only people who were considered saints were those who died for their faith, usually violently at the hands of the anti-Christian Roman emperors. They died because of their willingness to hold firm to their faith in Christ in the face of persecution.

The infants who were slaughtered at Herod's command clearly were too young to have any faith in Christ, and yet are regarded as martyrs. This is because their lives were taken *instead of* that of Christ. In a sense, they gave their lives for Christ, though without their knowledge. Interestingly, the number who died is regarded by scholars as between six and twenty-five.




