"I will make you the light of the nations..."

THIS WEEKEND MARKS our return to Sundays in Ordinary Time after the season of Advent and the subsequent Sundays of Christmas, the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God and The Epiphany of the Lord. Sundays in Ordinary Time will continue for the next five weeks until we move into Lent late next month.

This is an interesting time liturgically because we are still technically in the Christmas cycle (which ends on Candlemas, 02 February), though Christmastide ended on



the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, hence the return to green vestments the day after that feast. This time of year marks something of an in-between time, which varies in length depending on when Ash Wednesday falls, (this year on 22 February). And so, this period of Ordinary Time is short compared to the long run we have each year between Pentecost and Advent.

So, what will be hearing over the next few Sundays in Ordinary Time before we move into Lent? Let us not forget that we are now in Year A of the Sunday liturgical cycle and so will hear from Matthew's Gospel throughout the year, though this weekend is an exception. This Sunday we have the one instance where we hear from John, but over the next few weeks we will hear from chapters four and five of Matthew, including the Beatitudes and some passages from the first part of the famous Sermon on the Mount.

But this weekend our Gospel operates as a sort of "hinge" between the Epiphany and Jesus' preaching which we will hear the beginning of next Sunday. Just as the Magi acknowledged Jesus' divinity in last weekend's celebration, as did the shepherds earlier, this weekend we hear John the Baptist do the same, and so the reader has great confidence that the preaching we will hear in the Gospel over the next few weeks is indeed from the Messiah, the Anointed One, the Christ. His divinity has been confirmed on multiple counts.

Having looked very briefly at the Gospel passage, let us turn our attention to this Sunday's First Reading. The section of the Prophet Isaiah from which this extract is taken was written during the time of the Babylonian exile and was meant to give hope to the exiled Israelites in a time of darkness and despair. The last two lines that we hear this weekend can be understood in various ways. The lines read:

I will make you the light of the nations so that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth. (Isaiah 49:6)

Scholars have differing opinions about the one being addressed by these words. Is it an individual, or does it refer to the nation of Israel as a whole? Either way, it would surely be remiss of us to not see that each of us has the mission to reflect to all whom we encounter the same light of Christ that has enlightened us. How we do that is as individual as each of us, but it is essentially what we are baptised to do.

Let us pray that in the week ahead we can reflect some of that light to others, helping them to see Christ more clearly, the one who was born, suffered and died for our salvation.

The spiritual testament of Pope Benedict XVI (2006)

When, at this late hour of my life, I look back on the decades I have wandered through, I see first of all how much reason I have to give thanks. Above all, I thank God Himself, the giver of all good gifts, who has given me life and guided me through all kinds of confusion; who has always picked me up when I began to slip, who has always given me anew the light of His countenance. In retrospect, I see and understand that even the dark and arduous stretches of this path were for my salvation and that He guided me well in those very stretches.

I thank my parents, who gave me life in difficult times and prepared a wonderful home for me with their love, which shines through all my days as a bright light until today. My father's clear-sighted faith taught us brothers and sisters to believe and stood firm as a guide in the midst of all my scientific knowledge; my mother's heartfelt piety and great kindness remain a legacy for which I cannot thank her enough. My sister has served me selflessly and full of kind concern for decades; my brother has always paved the way for me with the clear-sightedness of his judgements, with his powerful determination, and with the cheerfulness of his heart; without this ever-new going ahead and going along, I would not have been able to find the right path.

I thank God from the bottom of my heart for the many friends, men and women, whom He has always placed at my side; for the co-workers at all stages of my path; for the teachers and students He has given me. I gratefully entrust them all to His goodness. And I would like to thank the Lord for my beautiful home in the Bavarian foothills of the Alps, in which I was able to see the splendour of the Creator Himself shining through time and again. I thank the people of my homeland for allowing me to experience the beauty of faith time and again. I pray that our country will remain a country of faith and I ask you, dear compatriots, not to let your faith be distracted. Finally, I thank God for all the beauty I was able to experience during the various stages of my journey, but especially in Rome and in Italy, which has become my second home.

I ask for forgiveness from the bottom of my heart from all those whom I have wronged in some way.

What I said earlier of my compatriots, I now say to all who were entrusted to my service in the Church: Stand firm in the faith! Do not be confused! Often it seems as if science - on the one hand, the natural sciences; on the other, historical research (especially the exegesis of the Holy Scriptures) - has irrefutable insights to offer that are contrary to the Catholic faith. I have witnessed from times long past the changes in natural science and have seen how apparent certainties against the faith vanished, proving themselves not to be science but philosophical interpretations only apparently belonging to science - just as, moreover, it is in dialogue with the natural sciences that faith has learned to understand the limits of the scope of its affirmations and thus its own specificity.

For sixty years now, I have accompanied the path of theology, especially biblical studies, and have seen seemingly unshakeable theses collapse with the changing generations, which turned out to be mere hypotheses: the liberal generation (Harnack, Juelicher, etc.), the existentialist generation (Bultmann, etc.), the Marxist generation. I have seen, and see, how, out of the tangle of hypotheses, the reasonableness of faith has emerged and is emerging anew. Jesus Christ is truly the Way, the Truth, and the Life - and the Church, in all her shortcomings, is truly His Body.

Finally, I humbly ask: pray for me, so that the Lord may admit me to the eternal dwellings, despite all my sins and shortcomings. For all those entrusted to me, my heartfelt prayer goes out day after day.

Benedictus PP XVI.

Pope Benedict and Cardinal Pell

Just as the news was sinking in of the death of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, we received news on Wednesday of the more unexpected death of Cardinal George Pell, also in Rome and at the relatively young age of 81. He died apparently from heart complications following hip replacement surgery, having had a history of heart problems. Inevitably, much will be written about the legacy of both these towering figures in the Church and on the world stage, some good and some not so, but amid all the chatter on social media, whatever merit it may have, let us as fellow Christians pray for the repose of their souls and ask that they be admitted into God's kingdom through God's mercy.

Clergy movements

We have been very blessed here in recent months to have had a "full house" (literally!) of clergy here at the cathedral, at one stage having six priests and one deacon in residence! All good things come to an end, and this situation is rapidly changing. Fr Jack Green has returned to studies in England and Fr Robert William is on leave until mid-February. Fr Raymond, who was staying here before being appointed to a parish, has just now moved to Greystanes where he will be assistant priest. Deacon Matthew is heading off on retreat this week before his ordination to the priesthood and I will pass on any news of his future with you once it comes to hand. So, we are essentially back to myself, Fr Chris and Fr Joseph for the time being.

I will have news about some other personnel movements in the coming weeks which will see the cathedral ministry greatly enriched. Fr Robert

Saint of the Week

16 January - St Joseph Vaz

Joseph Vaz was a missionary priest born in 1651 in Goa, India. He died on 16 January 1711 in Kandy, present day Sri Lanka. He arrived in Sri Lanka during the Dutch occupation when Calvinism was made the official religion in that country. Fr Vaz travelled throughout Sri Lanka bringing the Eucharist and other sacraments to clandestine groups of Catholics, sometimes disguising himself as a beggar to do so. By the time of his death, he had managed to rebuild the Catholic



Church in Sri Lanka. He was canonised by Pope Francis in Colombo, the Sri Lankan capital, on 14 January 2015, twenty years after his beatification.



Did You Know...


...that in Matthew's Gospel, which we will hear from on Sundays this year, the Evangelist portrays Jesus as the new (and greater) Moses?

Matthew was writing for an audience that was predominantly Jewish and so this approach makes a lot of sense. Some examples of the similarities Matthew draws between Jesus and Moses include Jesus as a baby nearly being killed and having to go into exile, Jesus fasting for forty days and then ascending a mountain to preach, and his walking on the Sea of Galilee, just as Moses parted the Red Sea.
