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Farewell, St Pat's...

ST PAT'S, I MOVE OUT THIS WEEK to go to St Bernadette's Parish in Castle Hill, where I have been appointed to exercise my newfound priestly ministry. It has been a joy to serve you as a deacon and to be a part of your lives over this last year. I have come to know each of you in a unique way, and as much as it was my duty to minister to you, I have benefitted so much from your company. It was an honour to be let into your lives, and to hear many of you share how the Lord is working in you. I loved seeing your piety, especially in daily adoration, frequent use of the Sacrament of Confession, and the regular use of the chapel for private prayer. I will remember my time here fondly, and I hope to come back and visit when I can. Below, I leave you with one final bulletin reflection.



Jesus says in today's Gospel, "I have come not to abolish [the Law and the Prophets] but to complete them." Jesus is referring to the Law of Moses, given by God to the Israelites at Mount Sinai. This law is contained in the first five books of the Old Testament, the Pentateuch, and it consists of over 600 laws governing all facets of the lives of the people of Israel: morality, civil affairs, ceremonial rituals, and so on.

I want to draw out just one point about how Jesus's teachings fulfill and deepen the Mosaic Law. The Mosaic Law for the most part regulated external actions: what you ate, what you wore, how to conduct business, which animals had to be sacrificed and when, fines and punishments for breaking the laws, and so on.

Each of these laws had a purpose: to instil holiness in the People of God. Such holiness is also the goal of Jesus's teaching. But the Old Testament aimed to teach this holiness from the outside in, so to speak: it governed exterior behaviour, that is, actions done with one's tongue, hands and feet. When Jesus teaches us how to live in the Kingdom of Heaven, he shifts the focus from external, exterior behaviour to the interior life, the heart. He aims to teach the precepts of the law both inside and out.

In today's Gospel, he takes a number of Old Testament Laws and shows how they ought to be lived in spirit. First, he says that loving one's brother means more than avoiding violent behaviour towards them: true charity goes to the extent of avoiding even denigrating thoughts about them, such as calling them a "fool." Purity consists not only in refraining from lustful actions, but it also requires protecting the dignity of others even in your heart. And lastly, a follower of Christ not only tells the truth after they take a solemn oath, but they are honest and truthful all the time because their hearts are free from deceit.

To be truly holy means that our whole being must be aligned to God, down to the deepest recesses of our minds and hearts. If this seems difficult, there is a great cause for hope: "God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us." (Romans 5:5) The work of the transformation of souls is accomplished by the power of God working in us. So, with great confidence, let us place our trust in the Holy Spirit and follow his inspirations.

Connecting the Gospel

The first reading introduces the theme of obedience, and the importance of steadfastly avoiding sin. It emphasises the human power to choose between good and evil, and warns that each person is responsible for the choices they make. This is followed by the responsorial psalm where the entire assembly proclaims, "Happy are they who follow the law of the Lord!"

to Christian living

The demands of Christian discipleship are set out in uncompromising fashion in this gospel. A thorough conversion of heart and mind is required, such that the purity of a person's inmost thoughts is reflected in the goodness of their outward actions.

Such was said to your ancestors; but I am speaking to you.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'Do not imagine that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets. I have come not to abolish them but to complete them. I tell you solemnly, till heaven and earth disappear, not one dot, one little stroke, shall disappear from the Law until its purpose is achieved. Therefore, the man who infringes even one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do the same will be considered the least in the kingdom of heaven; but the man who keeps them and teaches them will be considered great in the kingdom of heaven.

'For I tell you, if your virtue goes no deeper than that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never get into the kingdom of heaven.

'You have learnt how it was said to our ancestors: You must not kill; and if anyone does kill he must answer for it before the court. But I say this to you: anyone who is angry with his brother will answer for it before the court; if a man calls his brother "Fool" he will answer for it before the Sanhedrin; and if a man calls him "Renegade" he will answer for it in hell fire. So then, if you are bringing your offering to the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your offering there before the altar, go and be reconciled with your brother first, and then come back and present your offering. Come to terms with your opponent in good time while you are still on the way to the court with him, or he may hand you over to the judge and the judge to the officer, and you will be thrown into prison. I tell you solemnly, you will not get out till you have paid the last penny.

'You have learnt how it was said: You must not commit adultery. But I say this to you: if a man looks at a woman lustfully, he has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye should cause you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; for it will do you less harm to lose one part of you than to have your whole body thrown into hell. And if your right hand should cause you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; for it will do you less harm to lose one part of you than to have your whole body go to hell.

'It has also been said: Anyone who divorces his wife must give her a writ of dismissal. But I say this to you: everyone who divorces his wife, except for the case of fornication, makes her an adulteress; and anyone who marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

'Again, you have learnt how it was said to our ancestors: You must not break your oath, but must fulfil your oaths to the Lord. But I say this to you: do not swear at all, either by heaven, since that is God's throne; or by the earth, since that is his footstool; or by Jerusalem, since that is the city of the great king. Do not swear by your own head either, since you cannot turn a single hair white or black. All you need say is "Yes" if you mean yes, "No" if you mean no; anything more than this comes from the evil one.'

17 February - The Seven Holy Founders of the Servite Order

In the early thirteenth century seven young Florentines formed a confraternity of laymen devoted to the praise of Mary. In 1233, after a vision on the feast of the Assumption, they took up the life of hermits on Monte Senario outside Florence. They went preaching through the whole of Tuscany and founded the order of the Servants of the Blessed Virgin Mary, known as the Servites, whose foundation was approved by the Pope in 1304. Their feast is



celebrated today because one of the seven founders, St Alexis Falconieri, died on 17 February 1310.


