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## Joy, Sadness and Hope

TODAY'S READINGS bring out three strong emotions in me.

The first emotion it brings out is JOY! The first reading depicts such a beautiful picture of how the early Christians lived. Their Christianity radically changed them: They were generous. They practised fellowship with each other. They studied scripture. They prayed and praised God. This is what Christianity looks like. Each person is an Alter Christus, another Christ. How utterly beautiful. How radical!



And as a consequence, they were, of course, a blessing to the world. We are told they were looked up to by everyone.

The second emotion it brings out is SADNESS! Why? Because we don't look very much like them. Is this how people would describe us here today? Do we live like this? Are we looked up to by everyone?

Well, the hard answer is largely "No". And why is that? The answer is easy: we don't live as they lived. We are not living and loving in the radical Christian way that they did. They were Christians; we are Christian-ish. And that's not the same thing at all. As Mahatma Gandhi once said: 'I like your Christ, I do not like your Christians. Your Christians are so unlike your Christ.'

Now, let me answer myself: "Dave, this is all a bit unfair. I have just finished Lent - I gave up sweet things for forty days! And I've just attended a whole series of Easter Liturgies, and I was very moved by some of them."

And then I'd have to say to myself: "Whoop-de-doo!"

How did Lent change me? In what way has it made me more like those early Christians?

And those liturgies, those beautiful liturgies, have not been given to us to move us for a moment. A ballet, an opera, a sad movie can do that. These liturgies have been given to us to change our lives!

And that brings me to my third emotion: HOPE. This is Easter. We are the people of the Resurrection! For each of us, our story is not yet over. There is still time, time to become what we are called to become.

In today's gospel Jesus tells Thomas to touch his wounds. That invitation and that encounter with Christ changed Thomas into a true believer.

Pope Francis, in his beautiful reflections for the Stations of the Cross, encourages us to see Christ's wounds as the wounded people around us. He tells us to dare to touch those wounds, to engage with these wounded people, with love and tenderness, We don't have to look very far! We are surrounded by wounded people. Many of us have them in our families, in our friendship groups, in our workplace. There are wounded people living in the park opposite our cathedral!

Now, wounded people are messy and difficult, and engaging with them can open us up to pain, rejection, and suffering. It will not require just love and tenderness; it will require courage, patience and forgiveness. Basically, everything that makes a true Christian.

When we take steps like that, radical steps, then we begin to look a lot more like the early Christians, the Christians we are still called to be, and when we live and love like this, we will encounter Christ.

And then we can exclaim, in truth, with Thomas: "My Lord, and my God!"








The faithful all lived together and owned everything in common; they sold their goods and possessions and shared out the proceeds among themselves according to what each one needed.



#### Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John (20:19-31) After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, :'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me,

so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit.

For those whose sins you forgive,

they are forgiven;

for those whose sins you retain,

they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord,' he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you,' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me,

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

## For a culture of peace and non-violence

Blessed Clara was born in Pisa. Italy, in 1362, married at the age of twelve and widowed at the age of fifteen. She longed to join a religious order, but her family objected. When at last they relented, upon the advice of Saint Catherine of Siena she received the Dominican habit at the Monastery of the Holy Coss in Pisa. In 1385, along with Blessed Maria Mancini, she

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



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
