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# "You foolish men, so slow to believe..."

WHAT CAN BE SAID about the post-resurrection story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus that hasn't already been stated? Today's Gospel presents us with a story so familiar to us that, as it is proclaimed at Mass, we can easily find ourselves either tuning out or thinking ahead to the end of the passage. To do this is to treat the scriptures as mere stories, stories of a similar nature to those that friends or family members tell repeatedly, we perhaps being too polite to tell them to stop since "we've heard this one before".



Of course, being divinely inspired, we can never exhaust the meaning of the scriptures since they speak to all peoples, in all circumstances and at all times, and the message received will be different according to the variables in play. Yet even if the message we take away from today's Gospel simply reinforces or reminds us of what we have already learnt, that means our attentiveness will not have been in vain.

The title of this column comes from the words of Jesus as he speaks to the two disciples who are walking away from Jerusalem, away from the site of not only the crucifixion of Jesus, but also of his resurrection. They are dejected. They have heard reports that Jesus is alive, but that is all. The irony that the risen Jesus is walking with them is not lost on us.

Jesus, never slow to bring others to task, responds to the disciples' lack of faith with the words that are quoted above: "You foolish men, so slow to believe...". Yet, he doesn't simply reprimand them and leave. Jesus, out of love for his disciples, helps them come to faith by painstakingly explaining the scriptures to them. Following that, he then breaks bread with them and at that point the reality of his identity hits them intensely. But before they can say anything to Jesus, he vanishes. The dynamic that we witness here is quite remarkable: the disciples move from despondency to curiosity, then a light dawns on them before the truth strikes. They are then eager to share their experience with others.

This dynamic ought not to be unique to this wonderful story. Rather than seeing this Gospel passage as simply a superb story of two people coming to faith, let us see it as a lesson for how we can understand our own relationship with Jesus. As Jesus did with Cleopas and his companion, he never gives up on us but accompanies us as we read the scriptures, walks with us in our doubts and even our despair, and makes his reality known to us in the Eucharist. As Jesus did with the two disciples, he will not "hang around" with us to keep us on some sort of "religious high" but will withdraw to give us the freedom to make his presence known to others, as Cleopas and his companion did when they made a significant move to make their way back to Jerusalem in haste.

It is perhaps this last part of the dynamic which deserves a little more focus. We recognise the reality of Jesus in the Eucharist, as well as in the scriptures, the presiding minister at Mass and in each other. Are we eager to share this truth with others? Do we really believe these truths? Or do we need to be humble and open ourselves to the reprimand of Jesus: "You foolish person, so slow to believe...".

After all, sometimes a loving reprimand is what we need!



#### to the point

The gospel begins and ends with an awareness of Christ's absence. At the center of the gospel Christ is present as the fulfilment of Scriptures and is recognised in the 'breaking of bread.' Our own 'breaking of bread' is our way to encounter this resurrected Christ. For the disciples - and for us - encounter leads to proclamation: 'The Lord has truly been raised.'

# Connecting the Gospel to last Sunday

Thomas' eyes were opened when he was invited to touch the broken body of Jesus. These disciples' eyes were opened when they encountered Christ in the broken bread. The broken body and the bread broken are the same revelation.

# LITURGY OF THE WORD

## First Reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

(2:14, 22-33)

On the day of Pentecost Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd in a loud voice: 'Men of Israel, listen to what I am going to say: Jesus the Nazarene was a man commended to you by God by the miracles and portents and signs that God worked through him when he was among you, as you all know. This man, who was put into your power by the deliberate intention and foreknowledge of God, you took and had crucified by men outside the Law. You killed him, but God raised him to life, freeing him from the pangs of Hades; for it was impossible for him to be held in its power since, as David says of him:

I saw the Lord before me always, for with him at my right hand nothing can shake me. So my heart was glad and my tongue cried out with joy: my body, too, will rest in the hope that you will not abandon my soul to Hades nor allow your holy one to experience corruption. You have made known the way of life to me, you will fill me with gladness through your presence.'

'Brothers, no one can deny that the patriarch David himself is dead and buried: his tomb is still with us. But since he was a prophet, and knew that God had sworn him an oath to make one of his descendants succeed him on the throne, what he foresaw and spoke about was the resurrection of the Christ: he is the one who was not abandoned to Hades, and whose body did not experience corruption. God raised this man Jesus to life, and all of us are witness to that. Now raised to the heights by God's right hand, he has received from the Father the Holy Spirit, who was promised, and what you see and hear is the outpouring of that Spirit.'

#### Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (24:13-35)

Two of the disciples of Jesus were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking together about all that had happened. Now as they talked this over, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognising him. He said to them, 'What matters are you discussing as you walk along?' They stopped short, their faces downcast.

Then one of them, called Cleopas answered him, 'You must be the only person staying in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days.' 'What things?' he asked. 'All about Jesus of Nazareth' they answered 'who proved he was a great prophet by the things he said and did in the sight of God and of the whole people; and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified. Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have gone by since it all happened; and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the tomb in the early morning, and when they did not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive. Some of our friends went to the tomb and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing.'

Then he said to them, 'You foolish men! So slow to believe the full message of the prophets! Was it not ordained that the Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory?' Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself.

When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them. 'It is nearly evening' they said 'and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them. Now while he was with them at the table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?'

They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, who said to them, 'Yes it is true, The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon.' Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.




# WYD - Trivia Night & Raffle Tickets

24 April - St Fidelis of Sigmaringen (1578-1622), Martyr

Fidelis was born in Sigmaringen in Germany. He joined the Capuchin Friars at the age of 35 and led a harsh life of prayer and vigils. An assiduous preacher, he was ordered by the Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith to preach orthodox doctrine in



the Grisons (part of Switzerland). He was murdered by a Calvinist mob at Seewis on 24 April 1622.


