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Before and after...

HAVE YOU SEEN those pictures they show you of people before and after a particular diet or an exercise program, or maybe pictures of celebrities before they went into rehab and then after they come out? (Sometimes I fear I look a little like the "before" photo...) Anyhow, the pictures always show a stark contrast. There is a real visible difference, and the stories generally speak about the life-changing aspects of this experience.



I sometimes think about this in the context of the disciples before and after Pentecost. Has there ever been a more life-changing event? When I think of the picture we have from scripture of the person that Peter was before Pentecost, I see a fearful man. I see the Peter that betrayed Christ three times out of fear. I see the Peter that, even after Christ's resurrection, together with the other disciples, was locked in the upper room "for fear of the Jews". After Pentecost, I see a Peter full of courage, preaching in public. I see him being thrown in prison, being flogged, being stoned, and then going straight back out and preaching again. And it wasn't just new courage, he had other gifts - most notably wisdom and understanding. Before Pentecost, no matter how many times Jesus explained who he was, Peter just couldn't seem to grasp it. He could only understand Jesus in terms of the type of Messiah he was expecting. After Pentecost he preached clearly. He knew exactly who Jesus was, and what Jesus's mission was.

What's really important for us to grasp is that this change did not come with Christ's resurrection. The scriptures describe Peter after the resurrection quite similarly to how he was before. No, the big transformation came with him receiving the Holy Spirit. In Luke's Acts of the Apostles, it was Pentecost; in John's gospel it was described a little differently, but in both cases the change came once they received the Holy Spirit.

So, how does all of this speak to us?

Well, this kind of transformative experience is available to each and every one of us. All we have to do is pray for it.

Now, some of you may say: "Didn't we receive the Holy Spirit at our baptism? And wasn't the Holy Spirit strengthened at our Confirmation? So why do I still need to pray for the Holy Spirit?"

Well, the best answer I can give you is this: many of us were too young when we received Confirmation to have really appreciated what was happening. We can see a few times in scripture where people said they had been baptised but they had not yet actually received the Holy Spirit. God always respects our free will. He waits for us to seek him and then responds. Scripture says: "You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart." There comes a time when we as adults have to decide to claim our faith for ourselves. We need to step up and take it with both hands.

Today, as we reflect upon the first incredible transformations of the Holy Spirit, perhaps we can pray for our very own transformation.

How exciting it will be to see what your "after" picture will look like...

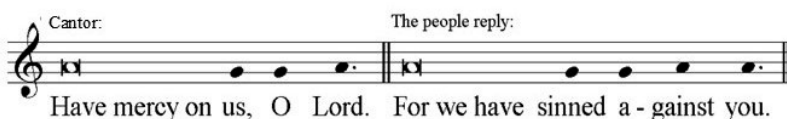

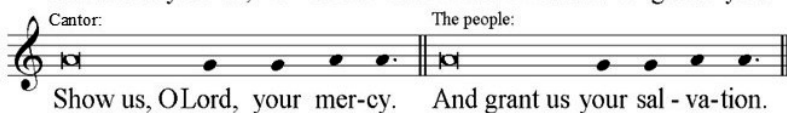

to the point

In John's gospel Jesus gives the Holy Spirit to the disciples on the evening of his resurrection. The Holy Spirit is the way Jesus shares with us even now his resurrection life. At the same time we share his life we share his mission - forgiveness of sins. The Holy Spirit, then, is the source of life and of mission.

Connecting the Gospel...

to the first reading

One of the 'mighty acts of God' (first reading) that the Spirit enables us to announce and hear is our 'sins . . . are forgiven' (gospel).

to Catholic culture

Though we commemorate the giving of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost Sunday, it is important that we not historicise or literalise this event for the Spirit is present to us from the beginning of our life in God..

"Receive the Holy Spirit."

Today we celebrate Pentecost Sunday which is called by many as the birthday of the Church. Let us take some time to reflect on the Holy Spirit in our lives as stewards. Firstly, we should never fail to marvel at the fact that starting with 11 lowly men 2000 years ago, the Catholic Church still continues to this day and the name of Jesus is praised and adored all over the world. This is the power of the Holy Spirit. From a human standpoint, the church should have failed centuries ago were not sustained by the Spirit. This should inspire us as stewards to rely on the Holy Spirit to guide all of our actions.



Moreover, in today's second reading from Corinthians, St. Paul says that "there are varieties of gifts, but the same spirit ... [and] to each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." PARRAMATTA DIOCESAN SYNOD 2023

THE CONVOCAATION

At the 11:00am Mass today, Bishop Vincent will convoke the Diocesan Synod after following due process. Some of the circumstances which led to the convocation of the Synod include: lack of an overall diocesan pastoral plan; the need to apply at local level norms and other directives; acute pastoral problems requiring pastoral solutions; a need to further a more intense ecclesial communion, and so on.

'To be synodal means to 'walk together' guided by the Holy Spirit. By convoking the Diocesan Synod on the Solemnity of Pentecost, the Bishop and the people of the Diocese invoke the Holy Spirit for leadership and guidance as we seek to learn and understand the path to becoming a more synodal church.

THE FUNDAMENTAL QUESTIONS

Last week we learned of the composition of the Synod. This week we hope that information given below will help you prepare for the consultation evening on Saturday 03 June.

The fundamental question that will guide the journey towards the Synod is:

In what ways can we respond to the call of the Holy Spirit to be a more synodal Church in the Diocese of Parramatta?

The Diocese of Parramatta, will use the three key dimensions expressed as pillars of a synodal church to guide local discussions for submissions. These are Communion, Participation, and Mission.

To assist participants to explore the fundamental question, the following questions aim to provide a framework for discussion in a one-on-one or group setting. The hope is that participants continue to dialogue with the desire to 'walk together' as a people of God, and with the whole of humanity. These questions serve as a catalyst for discussion. Participants are welcome to explore topics relating to the life and mission of the local Church beyond the questions provided.

Communion

1. What are the factors that make a great community? What brings people together?
2. How can the Church in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains deepen communion, and still honour the rich diversity of our community?
3. How do you try to accompany or 'walk with' family and friends through their struggles and joys?

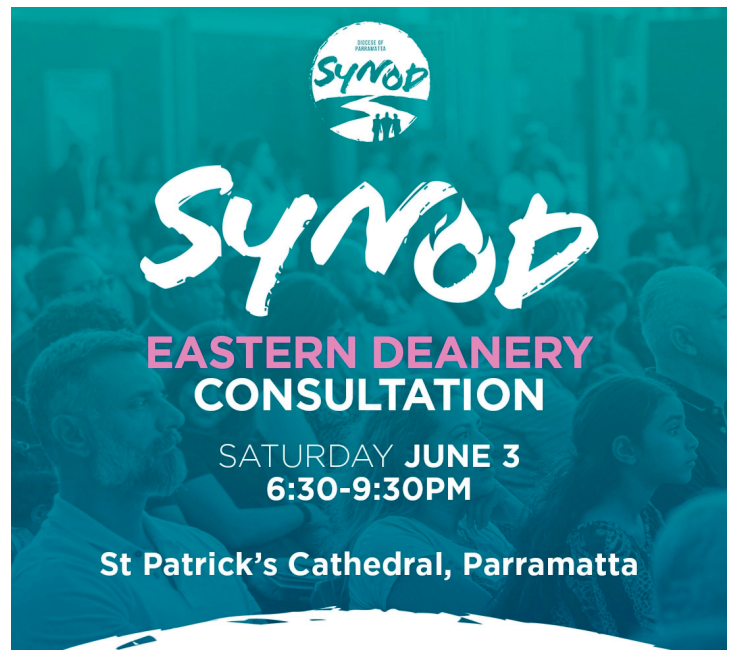
Participation:

1. What are the challenges or pressures that stop you from being more engaged in your local faith community?
2. How can we encourage greater participation in the life of the Church at both a local and Diocesan level?
3. How does your community effectively identify and share the gifts of its people?

Mission:

1. What do you believe the mission of the Church is in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains?
2. How do we ensure the ongoing nourishment of our faith communities, while expanding the tent for others to be included?

Saint of the Week

29 May - The Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church

In 2018 Pope Francis added a feast day for Mary, Mother of the Church to be celebrated on the Monday following Pentecost – and the date he chose was intentional. On Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the birthday of the Church, and on the memorial of Mary, Mother of the Church, we celebrate the fact that Mary, as the mother of Our Lord, is intrinsically linked to the Church as her mother.

In issuing his decree to add this feast day to the Church's calendar, Pope Francis wished to promote this devotion to "encourage the growth of the maternal sense of the Church in the pastors, religious and faithful, as well as a growth of genuine Marian piety."

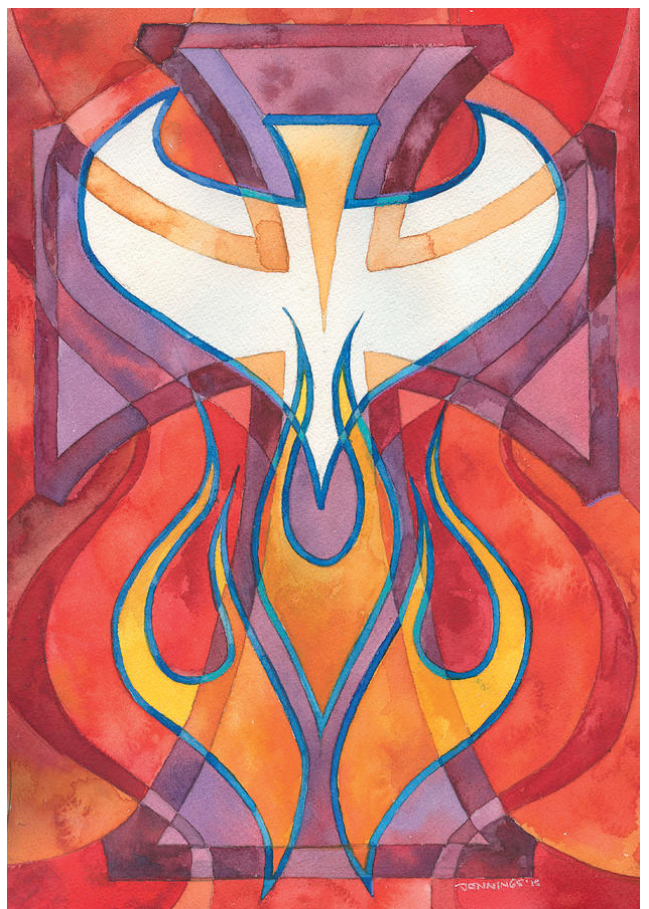
DID YOU KNOW?

The name "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word meaning "fiftieth." Like Easter, it is tied to a Jewish feast. 49 days (7 weeks, or "a week of weeks") after the second day of Passover, the Jews celebrated the Feast of Weeks (Shavuot).

Passover celebrates the freeing of the Jews from slavery; Shavuot celebrates their becoming God's holy people by the gift and acceptance of the Law; and the counting of the days to Shavuot symbolises their yearning for the Law.

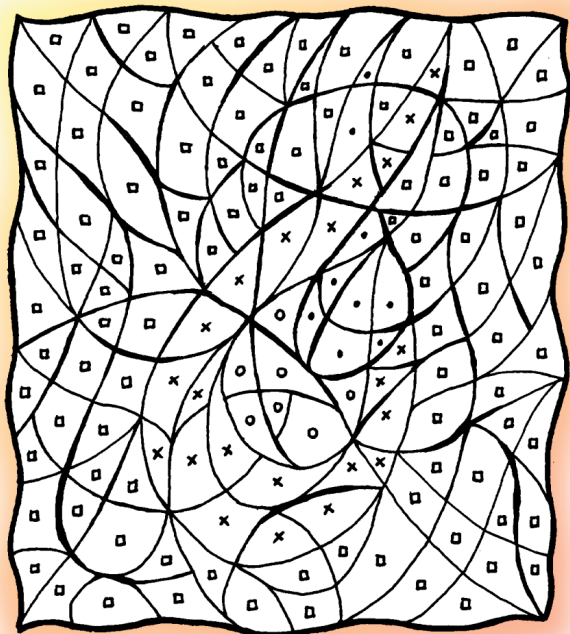
From a strictly practical point of view, Shavuot was a very good time for the Holy Spirit to come down and inspire the Apostles to preach to all nations because, being a pilgrimage festival, it was an occasion when Jerusalem was filled with pilgrims from many countries.

Symbolically, the parallel with the Jews is exact. We are freed from the slavery of death and sin by Easter; with the Apostles, we spend some time as toddlers under the tutelage of the risen Jesus; and when he has left, the Spirit comes down on us and we become a Church.
