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What's all this talk about a Synod?

THOSE OF YOU reading this will be aware that the Diocese of Parramatta will be hosting a synod later this year, 12-15 October, concluding with a gathering towards the middle of 2024. Over the past couple of weeks, the bulletin has featured some material on the synod, including the prayer that was specially composed for this important event in our diocese. We have also been praying for the success of the synod in our Sunday intercessory prayers. More information is contained further on in this bulletin, particularly about



the gathering to be held here at St Patrick's Cathedral on Saturday 03 June.

But what exactly is a synod and why are we having one in our diocese?

Whilst we could look at the vast history of the Church and see the various occasions when it has held synods, or similar events, to help decide how to move the Gospel most effectively into the future, the inspiration for the Parramatta synod surely has a more recent history – the influence of Pope Francis. Pope Francis has been instrumental in seeking to consult widely throughout the Church to garner the views of people apart from clerics and others in positions of power. He has sought to give more prominent positions to women and has emphasised the necessity for pastors to "have the smell of the sheep"; that is, to know well the people they are called to serve.

The Parramatta Diocese website notes: "A Synod is both an event and a process where clergy, consecrated, and the laity gather to discuss important matters relating to the life and mission of the Church. Synods are transformative events that lead to renewal in the Church's life." A synod is a coming together of the Body of Christ with the intention of listening to one another respectfully as a means of furthering the mission Christ has entrusted to us as a baptised and eucharistic people.

Bishop Vincent is seeking to hear the voices of as many people as possible. Of course, it is not possible to get every person who is interested in contributing their views in a room at the same time, and so there will be a series of smaller events held at a deanery level (as mentioned above), as well as the opportunity to contribute individually. A visit to the diocesan website will assist those of you wanting to know more.

Some of you may remember the landmark 1991 ABC television series "Brides of Christ". For those not familiar, I suggest you do yourself a favour and seek it out. It is about a group of young female religious novices working at a Catholic girls' school in the mid to late 1960s, soon after Vatican II and at a time of social upheaval. In all the talk of synodality of late, I am reminded of one scene in this series. An older religious sister, finding it difficult to cope with the changes that have taken place in religious life, has a breakdown and exclaims, "Just tell me what to do and I will do it!" She had been formed at a time when obedience was emphasised above all else and found it difficult to deal with the freedoms and responsibilities that came with changes to religious life.

May we instead make the most of the opportunity the diocesan synod gives us to help shape the future of the local Church, exercising our responsibility as a baptised, priestly people.







Saint of the Week

15 May - St Carthage (c.555 - 637), Priest

Carthage is also known as Mochuda. He was born in what is now County Kerry, in Ireland. After being a swineherd he joined a monastery and was ordained a priest. In 580 he determined to lead a hermit's life, but after a few years his hermitage had become a place of pilgrimage and he was expelled from it by the local abbots or bishops. After some time spent travelling and founding churches, he settled at Rahan near Tullamore and in 590 set up a monastery composing a rule for his monks to follow. In 653 Carthage and his monks were expelled from Rahan at the instigation of jealous



neighbours. He founded a new monastery at Lismore, and was the first bishop of the towm that grew up round it.


Submissions from these consultations and conversations will be collected and can be provided online, in person, or via mail.




