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Putting flesh on the bones of the unknowable

AS YOU ARE AWARE, the clergy here at the cathedral, Father Chris, Deacon David and I, take turns at writing the front-page reflection for each weekend's bulletin. As the Trinity is a notoriously impossible theological concept to comprehend fully, it is fair to say that none of us were looking forward to writing the reflection for Trinity Sunday this year! Nonetheless, the lot fell to me, and so I offer the following reflection with the understanding that it will inevitably fall short of doing justice to the subject at hand. It might be worthwhile checking the explanation of the



Trinity given on the children's page towards the end of the bulletin!

But what is so important about God as Trinity that the Church deems it worthy of a separate Sunday celebration, like Pentecost or Corpus Christi?

The answer to that question is, I suppose, as varied as the people of whom it is asked but one valid response is that which forms the title of this piece: putting flesh on the bones of the incomprehensible. God is certainly an entity we can never know fully during our time on earth, but God clearly does not want us to wallow in total ignorance of God's nature. Were that the case, I think very few people would bother practising their faith; indeed, there would likely be no faith in God at all. Who would want to worship that which we cannot know even a little?

Fortunately, our understanding of God as Trinity gives us some marvellous insights into an otherwise unknowable God. Most obviously, for us as Christians, we see the nature of God in the person of Jesus Christ, one whose mission encompasses love, mercy, acceptance, healing and life. Jesus talked of his intimacy with his Father and spent countless hours in prayer to him, often extending throughout the night. Jesus' intimacy with his heavenly Father and the fact that we too can call God our Father, gives us insight into the person of the Father, the God who seeks intimacy with us and considers us God's children. The First Reading today from Exodus, written some six hundred years before the birth of Jesus, talks of "a God of tenderness and compassion, slow to anger, rich in kindness and faithfulness." Finally, the person of the Holy Spirit is known to us as that which inspires us to live out the mission of Jesus and make him manifest to all whom we encounter, thus continuing his presence in a very tangible way here on earth in our own time.

Most importantly, we see in the relationship between these three persons of the Trinity a dynamic of love. The gospel this weekend seems to mention only the Father and the Son, but in fact the love between the two is the Spirit made manifest. The Trinity is the fullness of love, a love that is beyond our comprehension as mere human beings, and every comparison we make to try and understand something of the "love nature" of God as Trinity will fall well short of doing God justice.

Nonetheless, whilst it is an interesting and important theological exercise to understand the nature of God as Trinity, what is of greater importance is that we make our trinitarian God manifest by our manner of living and loving as disciples of the one God sent for our salvation, Jesus Christ. In doing this we put some tangible flesh on the bones of a God that would otherwise be totally unknowable to those we encounter.

All of us know how difficult it can be to live with others. What makes community possible is the safeguarding not of individual rights but the generosity of graciousness.



Stewardship and the Holy Trinity

"...help one another." (2 Corinthians 13:11)

Today we celebrate Trinity Sunday, an acknowledgement and celebration of God's nature as just one God but three Persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The very nature of God is love for, as we read in the scriptures, "God is love, and those who live in love live in God, and God lives in them." (1 John 4:16)

The picture you see to the right is a modern rendering of the famous "Rublev Icon", an icon which depicts the incident in Genesis 18 when



Abraham and Sarah provide hospitality to "three men" who visit them at Mamre. Sarah, past childbearing age, is promised a son the following year, a prophecy which proves true.

The point is clearly made in the story that Abraham and Sarah have been providing hospitality to God, in love, and God rewards them. Their provision of hospitality is not conditional, but they are rewarded nonetheless.

We might reflect this weekend on the nature of our giving of time, talent and treasure. Do I give to receive some reward, or is my giving reward enough itself because it is done with love?

Personal Reflection point:

How do I see the giving of my time, talent and treasure to my parish as an offering of love to both my fellow parishioners and my God?

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert".


(Isaiah 43:19)

Our guiding passage for the Synod is taken from a larger section of the Prophet Isaiah which was likely written toward the end of the Babylonian exile. This section broadly speaks of the Lord's plans to liberate and restore his people Israel, reminding us that God has saved his people before, and will again. As readers we are meant to see the connections between the two events — captivity in Egypt and exile in Babylon — but this is where verse 19 offers us a new insight to the old stories.

This verse presents a subtle yet vital turn in the purpose of the prophet's line of reasoning. God is most certainly affirming that he was the God of the Exodus, but he also asserts the wonderful freshness of his new act which is in process. In the past, God had made a way through the waters of the Red Sea; now he would make a new way, through the desert!

As we move towards the Diocesan Synod, let us reflect on the guiding passage as we discern ways we can respond to the call of the Holy Spirit to be a more synodal church.

We ask you to pray for the Bishop and the Synod and encourage you to continue the conversation by asking some of the fundamental questions given here. Let us not be afraid to be challenged but trust in the guidance and blessing of the Holy Spirit.



THE FUNDAMENTAL QUESTIONS

Last week we learned of the composition of the Synod. This week we hope that information given below will help you prepare for the consultation evening on Saturday 03 June.

The fundamental question that will guide the journey towards the Synod is:

In what ways can we respond to the call of the Holy Spirit to be a more synodal Church in the Diocese of Parramatta?

The Diocese of Parramatta, will use the three key dimensions expressed as pillars of a synodal church to guide local discussions for submissions. These are Communion, Participation, and Mission.

To assist participants to explore the fundamental question, the following questions aim to provide a framework for discussion in a one-on-one or group setting. The hope is that participants continue to dialogue with the desire to 'walk together' as a people of God, and with the whole of humanity. These questions serve as a catalyst for discussion. Participants are welcome to explore topics relating to the life and mission of the local Church beyond the questions provided.

Communion

- 1. What are the factors that make a great community? What brings people together?
- 2. How can the Church in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains deepen communion, and still honour the rich diversity of our community?
- 3. How do you try to accompany or 'walk with' family and friends through their struggles and joys?

Participation

- 1. What are the challenges or pressures that stop you from being more engaged in your local faith community?
- 2. How can we encourage greater participation in the life of the Church at both a local and Diocesan level?
- 3. How does your community effectively identify and share the gifts of its people?

Mission

- 1. What do you believe the mission of the Church is in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains?
- 2. How do we ensure the ongoing nourishment of our faith communities, while expanding the tent for others to be included?
- 3. Describe your local community and the needs you perceive. What are the ways in which we can meet the needs of today and into the future? Provide one practical suggestion on how we could meet that need.

Saint of the Week

08 June - St James Berthieu (1838-1896), Priest and Martyr

Jams Berthieu was born in 1838 in France. He was ordained a priest in 1864. At the age of 35 he joined the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and in 1875 left for Madagascar where he spent the rest of his life. The local people started fighting in order to chase away the French Colonialists and to destroy the Christian faith. The colonial authority managed to suppress the rebellion. But, in 1896, during another rebellion, Fr Berthieu was taken prisoner, beaten and put into prison. He was asked to reject his faith in order to save his life.




but he said he preferred death to apostasy. On the night of 08 June 1896, while he was praying, he was shot dead and his body thrown into the river Mananara.

DID YOU KNOW?

...that the nature of God as Trinity was the source of enormous debate in the early Church as well many heresies?

It is tempting to think that after Jesus had returned to heaven and sent the light of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples, everything about the nature of God was established and everyone who was a disciple of Jesus got on with the job of spreading the Good News without any major concerns.

Of course, that definitely wasn't the case!

Amongst most people of faith there was no real issue about God as Trinity but rather the relationship of the persons of the Trinity with each other. For example, were all three Persons divine? Did the Holy Spirit proceed from the Father and the Son, or just the Father? Were all uncreated, or was the Son created by the Father?

These questions were not resolved quickly, nor without vigorous debate. Indeed, the question about the procession of the Holy Spirit from both the Father and the Son (the Catholic position) still differs to this day from the position of the

Orthodox Church which holds that the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father only.


Perhaps the best-known heresy that dominated the early Church was the Arian heresy, named after the theologian Arius (256-336). In essence, he taught that the Son was created by the Father and so was not divine - he was simply the greatest of all creatures - and not of one nature with the Father.

As expected, the Church sought to define its belief about the nature of God held a series of councils to this effect, perhaps the most famous being the Council of Nicea (325) which formulated the Nicene Creed still used in the Church today, an indeed by all orthodox Christians. It was amended at the Council of Constantinople (381) and so its formal title is the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed.



The Holy Trinity

Today we are celebrating the feast of the Holy Trinity. "Trinity" means "three" and tells us that there are three Persons in God. There is only one God, but God is a relationship of the Father and the Son (Jesus) and the Holy Spirit.

Each of the Persons in the Holy Trinity is really God, so the Father is really God, and Jesus is really God, and the Holy Spirit is really God. But they are not all the same Person. Each of the Persons in the Holy Trinity is also equal to all the others. So the Father is not greater than the Son or the Holy Spirit; they are all equal.




