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God is not a genie

IN 1992 WALT DISNEY PICTURES released one of its most loved animated films, Aladdin. The film was based around the Arabic folktale of the same name and soon became a must-see for all ages. Personally, I have seen this movie numerous times growing up and can almost recite every lyric of every song in the movie. It's definitely a must-see! One of characters that makes this movie such a hit is the comedic genie. This supernatural character, voiced by the late Robin



Williams, is a complicated creature; he is undeniably loyal to his master, regardless of who it is, yet desires to be free from his servitude. The imprisoned genie offers the one who rubs his lamp three wishes of whatever his/her heart desires...with a few T's and C's, of course! In the movie, both Aladdin and Jafar make full use of their wishes, with the latter being tricked into becoming a genie himself and thus being cursed with almighty power but itty bitty living space. Whilst this may seem like a random thought in the mind of Fr Chris, I found the genie somewhat associated with our Gospel this Sunday. If the sower goes out to sow, why doesn't he ensure the seed fall on rich soil? Is God culpable for the many souls who adamantly reject him and his teachings? How can we understand this Gospel?


'God is not a genie.' I've found myself using this particular phrase more and more of late as I encounter penitents in the confessional. With the struggle of sin an unfortunate reality in the human experience, more and more of the faithful are turning to God as a means of solace and strength. Unfortunately, some have taken this approach with the wrong understanding. In their desire to overcome particular vices and reach holiness, their prayer for strength is similar to a wish to a genie. 'Give me strength!' 'Help me overcome this!' Change my heart!' Whilst these prayers are good, they also require people to use their God-given gifts and talents; in short, they must freely choose to cooperate with God's grace. Our Gospel for this Sunday speaks of the different fields on which the seed (Word of God) falls. God is so generous that his Word reaches all people, even those who do not desire him. This entails that people are responsible for tilling the soil of their hearts to earnestly receive the Word of God and so yield a rich harvest. God, as powerful as he is, cannot interfere with people's choices. otherwise their response to follow Our Lord's will would not be authentic. it would not be free. As such God leaves the decision to follow his will to each individual; free will, the decision to choose right or wrong, is integral in following God's will.

Dear friends, at times we wish the spiritual life could be as easy as three wishes; we would be holy and obedient in an instant! God's Word transforms lives, it turns sinners into saints. We have this wonderful opportunity to be saints of today and so draw others to encounter Our Lord...however it does require effort on our part. May we ask for the grace to be active in our pursuit of Our Lord and so yield a rich harvest.





A sower went out to sow.

Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such crowds gathered round him that he got into a boat and sat there. The people all stood on the beach, and he told them many things in parables. He said, 'Imagine a sower going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell on patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

Then the disciples went up to him and asked, 'Why do you talk to them in parables?' 'Because' he replied 'the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven are revealed to you, but they are not revealed to them.

For anyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. The reason I talk to them in parables is that they look without seeing and listen without hearing or understanding.

So in their case this prophecy of Isaiah is being fulfilled:

You will listen and listen again, but not understand, see and see again, but not perceive.

For the heart of this nation has grown coarse,

their ears are dull of hearing, and they have shut their eyes, for fear they should see with their eyes,

hear with their ears,

understand with their heart,

and be converted and be healed by me.

'But happy are your eyes because they see, your ears because they hear! I tell you solemnly, many prophets and holy men longed to see what you see, and never saw it; to hear what you hear, and never heard it.

'You, therefore, are to hear the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom without understanding, the evil one comes and carries off what was sown in his heart: this is the man who received the seed on the edge of the path. The one who received it on patches of rock is the man who hears the word and welcomes it at once with joy. But he has no root in him, he does not last; let some trial come, or some persecution on account of the word, and he falls away at once. The one who received the seed in thorns is the man who hears the word, but the worries of this world and the lure of riches choke the word and so he produces nothing. And the one who received the seed in rich soil is the man who hears the word and understands it; he is the one who yields a harvest and produces now a hundredfold, now sixty, now thirty.'







Saint of the Week

20 July - St Thorlak (1133-1193), Bishop, Patron of Iceland

Born in 1133 at Hlíðarendi in the see of Skálholt in southern Iceland, Thorlak was from an agrarian family. He was ordained a deacon before he was fifteen and a priest at the age of eighteen. He studied abroad at Paris with the Victorines, where he learned the Rule of Saint Augustine from roughly 1153 to 1159, and then studied canon law in Lincoln. Returning to Iceland in 1165, Thorlak founded a monastery of Canons Regular at Þykkvabær after refusing to marry a rich widow. There he devoted himself to a strictly religious life, refusing to marry (many other Icelandic priests were married) and devoting himself to reciting the Our Father, the Creed, and a hymn, as well as fifty Psalms.

Thorlak was consecrated a bishop by Augustine of Nidaros and worked to regulate the Augustinian Rule in Iceland, as well as eradicate simony, lay patronage, and clerical incontinency.

Thorlak was officially recognised as a saint of the Roman Catholic Church on 14 January 1984, when John Paul II canonised him and declared him the patron saint of Iceland.




