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## "Why be envious because I am generous?"

OUR CONCERN ABOUT missing out starts in childhood. I remember being jealous because my brother received – at least according to my very inaccurate measuring stick – a bigger piece of cake. How often, as we grow older, do we envy the achievements or acquisitions of others? We often criticise and resent those who seem to have more than us, especially if what they receive seems to come easily. When we are struggling, we can easily be drawn into resenting those who seem to 'have it easy'. We allow what others receive to create pain for



ourselves. Our fear of missing out seems to be the basis for our envy and jealousy.

In today's Gospel, we see the labourers who had worked all day complaining about the latecomers receiving the same wage. Most of us could identify with their anger. On a human level, it seems unjust. Yet those who worked all day got what they were promised. They were not cheated out of what was due to them. They were not angry because they missed out. They were angry because the landowner chose to be generous. The late workers were trying to find work, but couldn't. We could say that the landowner was justly supporting the families of the unemployed. While this is probably not a good policy for modern industrial relations, the parable makes some really important points.

As Isaiah reminds us, God's thoughts are not our thoughts, and God's ways are above our ways. We could object, and say that Jesus' parable is suggesting that God can act unjustly because he is God. But that's not the point that Jesus is making. He urges us to look at the bigger picture – to look at a much bigger picture! Today's responsorial psalm says, "how good is the Lord to all." The bigger picture is the wonderful generosity of our Father in heaven. We must look beyond our current circumstances to eternal truths, and trust that what seems unfair on a human scale will be met with God's generosity. When it comes to God's mercy and grace, we all receive the same. Whether we come to God early or late, the fullness of God's mercy and love is available to us.

Don't be envious, but rejoice that we are deeply loved.

God has no favourites. All we have to do is turn up for work — "to seek the Lord while he is still to be found." God is abundant; no-one misses out. Isaiah reminds us that our God is "rich in forgiving", whether we turn to him in childhood or old age, whether we rush quickly towards God's mercy or take our time and delay. God waits for us with open arms and a generous heart.

St Paul tells us that he would rather "be gone and be with Christ." He is reminding us of what awaits us. When that time comes, the losses and resentments of this life will fade into nothingness. Let us have faith and trust in our loving God, who desires to be generous to us, no matter when we turn up for work in the vineyard.

#### to the point

In this parable of the kingdom, more significant than the difficulty or duration of the work or the wages given is the landowner's repeated invitation - over the course of the entire day - to work in the vineyard. Similarly, God's generosity, so obvious in the full wages given to every worker, is first evident in the very invitation to discipleship which is extended equally to anyone who chooses to hear and answer. A kingdom perspective shifts our focus away from us to God.

#### Connecting the Gospel...


#### · to the first reading

The dynamic of the gospel is evident already in the first reading. Isaiah admonishes 'the wicked man [to] abandon his way' and instead 'turn to the God who is rich in forgiving'.

#### · to culture

Our cultural perspective makes it difficult for us to hear this gospel because we tend to focus on ourselves. When we think of ourselves as the labourers, then we are distressed by the inequity of wages. God invites another perspective.

At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'



### Saint of the Week

30 September - St Jerome (c.340 - 420), Priest, Doctor

Jerome was born in Strido, in Dalmatia. He studied in Rome and was baptized there. He was attracted by the ascetic life and travelled to the East, where he was (unwillingly) ordained a priest. He was recalled to Rome to act as secretary to Pope Damasus, but on the Pope's death he returned to the East, to Bethlehem, where (with the aid of St Paula and others) he founded a monastery, a hospice, and a school, and settled down to the most important work of his life, the translation of the Bible into Latin, a translation which, with some revisions, is still in use today. He wrote many works of his own, including letters and commentaries on Holy Scripture. When a time of troubles came upon the world, through barbarian invasions, and to the Church, through internal dissension, he helped the refugees and those in need. He died at Bethlehem.

## "Quote of the Week"

"We live in a worldly society, which worries me a lot. It worries me when worldliness makes its way into consecrated life. Just today a letter I wrote to the priests of Rome about clericalism, which is a form of worldliness, was made public. Look, spiritual worldliness is an often recurring pitfall. You have to learn to distinguish: it is one thing to prepare for dialogue with the world - as you do with dialogue with the worlds of art and culture - it is another thing to compromise yourself with the things of the world, with worldliness.

I was deeply struck by the conclusion of a book by Father de Lubac: he dedicates the final four pages of *Meditation on the Church....*to spiritual worldliness. Have you who do discernment ever questioned yourselves about your own personal spiritual worldliness? Am I worldly, spiritually? That is a question I leave you with. And do you know what de Lubac says? He says that this is the worst evil that can penetrate the Church, worse even than in the era of the libertine popes."

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


Heaven to all the people who choose to love Him.



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
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
