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Thank you....and farewell

I'VE OFTEN ASKED the Lord in my prayers to teach me how to be the perfect disciple... How providential that my final bulletin reflection as Priest of the Cathedral Parish considers the nature of discipleship. Discipleship as we know it is the science of following Jesus Christ in order to attain, through the mercy of God, the beatific vision in Heaven; we hope and pray each of us be rewarded with eternal life when our earthly pilgrimage is over. This is our aim. This is why we follow Christ and his teachings. So, the question stands: how do I get there? What must I do to attain eternal life? When considering this question we usually turn to the saints for answers; after all



they've completed the crucible of life and now enjoy the delights of Heaven. However, if you're like me, a perfectionist at the core who gets disappointed at one's sins, it seems almost impossible to follow Our Lord's ways. How can I possibly reach Heaven if I'm bogged down by concupiscence and my ever-growing list of sins? This, friends, is solved by our Gospel for this Sunday.

At first glance it doesn't give much... a parable of two sons tasked to work in their father's field. One says no but eventually gets to work, the other says yes but does not go. Obviously the one who does the father's will is deemed blessed as he eventually gets to work - he wins the approval of Christ as he overcomes his initial reluctance to follow his father's instructions. It is here where the answer to my question of perfect discipleship reveals itself. Notice that the father does not question the initial reluctance of the first son, nor does he berate him for his attitude upon returning home. Rather, the first son is praised for enacting the father's will. Period. The father does not bring up past mistakes, he offers him true happiness. Similarly, Christ offers the promise of admittance into the Kingdom of God to those who follow his will. Discipleship, therefore, is not a smooth path to perfection; it is a constant battle against ourselves and temptation, both from the devil and world. similar to Christ's difficult journey to Calvary. It's hard. At times we stumble and fall, we may even choose to draw away from God... yet once divine grace again opens our heart to the possibility of eternal life and we find the path of discipleship the only road worth pursuing. The perfect disciple is not one without struggle. The perfect disciple is one who does not shy away from difficulties; he/she journeys on with Christ towards eternal life.

As I write this reflection I can proudly say the Lord has answered my prayers (I'm not perfect... I'm still working on it) through my ministry with you, the Cathedral Parish. I've made mistakes along the way and am prone to dwelling on them. However, you've been quick to raise me up again and spur me on with my priestly work to lead you to Jesus Christ. It is both humbling and inspiring when those whom I am called to serve are the ones picking me up when I'm down. To that I say thank you. Thank you for your prayers. Thank you for your witness. Thank you for your friendship (it's not ending here). Thank you for your love. I am eternally grateful to God that he placed me at St. Patrick's Cathedral to begin my vocation as a Priest of Jesus Christ. I love you very much, St. Patrick's Cathedral Parish.

Please keep me in your prayers as I begin in Springwood. Also know this is not a goodbye, I plan on keeping all my friendships as Parramatta has become my home. Also, I'm only up the road... albeit the M4!







The Gloria is a beautiful prayer that we sing towards the beginning of Mass, meant as a way to direct our praises to God in celebration of his coming as man 2000 years ago. We begin with the words of the angels in Luke 2, rejoicing that our Saviour is born and has come to redeem us.

"And suddenly there was a multitude of the heavenly host with the angel, praising God and saying: 'Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests."" - Luke 2:13-14 | NABRE

The Gloria, being a hymn of praise, is typically sung in a joyful and celebratory manner.

During a Catholic Mass, the entire congregation may participate, led by the priest or a cantor with musical accompaniment from an organ or other instruments. On some occasions, the Gloria may be sung by the choir alone with the congregation joining their hearts and minds in the praise and adoration being offered to God.

Let us pray.

O God, who manifest your almighty power above all by pardoning and showing mercy, bestow, we pray, your grace abundantly upon us and make those hastening to attain your promises heirs to the treasures of heaven.





Saint of the Week

03 October - St Francis Borgia (1510-1572), Priest

Francis Borgia (1510-1572) was born in Valencia, Spain. Although as a child he wished to become a monk, his family sent him instead to be trained for life at court, where he distinguished himself in the diplomatic service of Charles V, the Holy Roman Emperor and king of Spain, and as viceroy of Catalonia. He married in 1529 and had eight children. A gifted musician and composer, he was considered one of the chief restorers of sacred music (prior to Palestrina). In May 1539, he was missioned to accompany the corpse of the empress Isabella, who had died unexpectedly fifteen days earlier, to her burial place in Granada. He was shocked to see her beautiful face disfigured beyond recognition. This experience proved to be the turning point of his life. After his wife's death in 1546, he joined the Society of Jesus. In 1565 he was elected the third superior general of the Society of Jesus. He died in Rome in 1572.

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
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
