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"Give to God what belongs to God."

IN TODAY'S GOSPEL, we see the Pharisees setting out to trap Jesus. His message was a threat to their power. They flatter him, then ask him a rather inflammatory question; "Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?" Their assumption was that Jesus would say that they didn't owe anything to Caesar, thereby incriminating himself, and possibly leading to his arrest. Instead, Jesus takes a coin and addresses the issues directly. If the coin has Caesar's head on it, it belongs to Caesar.



Jesus then takes the opportunity to challenge the Pharisees – and us – to get our priorities right. We need to respect civil authority and act as good citizens. Yet, there is a greater calling. Elsewhere, Jesus urges us to 'seek first the Kingdom of God' and all the other necessities of life will be taken care of. Being a disciple of Jesus does not require us to despise the world or to neglect our civic duty. It requires us to prioritise the things of God, to love God and to seek to live according to the dictates of God's Reign.

Isaiah reminds us that the Lord is unrivalled – "there is no other God besides me". Are there things that rival God in our lives? We can become attached to many things that take us away from God. Sometimes we get distracted by our cares and worries, to the point that these things become a 'god' for us, our primary focus. Sometimes, these can lead us to lose trust in God, thus harming our faith. Our prayer life can suffer because we allow our concerns to build to the point where we become distracted and don't have time for God.

"Give to God what belongs to God." What belongs to God? We are called to love God above all else. This is Jesus' first commandment to us. His second is to love one another. Jesus calls us to love God and to live according to gospel values. When we embrace the values and way of life of the Reign of God, we give to God. We also give to others, including our civil society. In behaving as true disciples, we make God's love known and we help to create a better society. When we live the Good News with "utter conviction", as Paul describes in the second reading, we become true disciples. In giving ourselves to God for his service, we "give to God what belongs to God." When we give to 'Caesar' what really belongs to God, we lose our conviction.

Today's gospel urges us to take care of our day-to-day concerns, but to remain focussed primarily on God and on what God is asking of us. Let us not allow our daily concerns to prevent us from living our faith life, from giving to God what belongs to God.



To entrap Jesus the Pharisees pose an either/or dilemma: pay taxes or not. Jesus refuses the bait and affirms that we have both civic and religious obligations. But these obligations are radically different: to the state we pay taxes, but to God we give undivided service (see first reading) and worship (see responsorial psalm).

Connecting the Gospel...


• to the first reading

At the time of the gospel events, Caesar is the supreme authority. In God's plan, all earthly rulers, like Cyrus the Persian, are to be servants of God.

• to culture

Income taxes are automatically deducted from salaries; we are barely conscious of it. Our service of God, however, is not exacted from us but is freely and consciously given.








Table Talk with People Seeking Asylum

Saint of the Week

25 October - St Antonio Galvao (1739-1822), Priest

Antônio Galvão was born in the state of São Paulo to a deeply religious family of high social and political status. He was educated by the Jesuits from the age of 13, but although he wanted to become a Jesuit this was judged inopportune because of official persecution of the order (which was suppressed in the Portuguese Empire in 1759). Instead, at the age of 16, Galvão joined the Franciscans and took the name of 'Anthony of St Anne' in honour of his family's devotion to that saint.

He was ordained a priest in 1762 and transferred to São Paulo, where, with only brief intervals, he spent the rest of his life. He was revered as a confessor and a healer, and popular devotion to him was such that both ecclesiastical postings and governmental decrees that would have taken him away from São Paulo soon had to be rescinded. He died there on 23 December 1822, at the Recollect House (a hermitage which he had served and defended since 1769).

He was beatified in 1998 by Pope John Paul II and canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on 11 May 2007 during his visit to Brazil. He is the first Brazilian-born saint.


