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Seeing Christ in all

HAVE YOU EVER met a celebrity? A sports star, a music star? It's special, isn't it? I mean it's inevitable, we treat them differently. And what if one came to your house – that would be a huge deal wouldn't it? You would sit them down, bring them beautiful food and drink – really look after them.

What if the Bishop visited your house? That would be big. Or the Pope? That would be huge! Now, think about how you would be if Jesus himself came to your house. How well would you treat him? Off the charts, I reckon.



Jesus is loved by so many people, and there are of course many, many reasons to love him but the biggest reason of all, is that he loved us first. There is no greater love that one person can show for another than to give up their life for them, and Jesus gave up his life, his beautiful, beautiful life, for us.

But his love did not begin and end there. All through his life he had described his love and shown his love for people, and the people he loved most were the people least loved by everyone else – the poor, the sick, the marginalised, the prisoners.

Jesus never wanted special treatment for himself, he was entirely humble. When the inhabitants of Jerusalem tried to treat him as a king when he entered Jerusalem, he insisted on riding on a donkey. At the Last Supper he insisted on washing his disciples' feet. He was very humble but equally he was entirely aware that people would want to treat him in a special way. So, in another remarkable act of love he was prepared to switch places with those "least loved" people.

He told his disciples in today's Gospel, and he tells us today: "Every poor person, every homeless person, every refugee, every marginalised person, every mentally or physically ill person, every prisoner you come across, is me. You must see me in them and treat them the way you would treat me if you found me in that situation."


Anyone who has become a parent, or has taken a parentlike role in someone's life, knows that it changes you, it changes your perspectives. I care more about how people treat my children than I care about how they treat me. I feel so grateful for every act of kindness towards them, and I feel a deep, deep pain from every act of unkindness or cruelty towards them. In this context, we should consider every person as a child of God, a child of Jesus, and remember that when one of his children suffers, he feels deeply their pain. With this in mind, it is not enough that we love and care for the "least loved" people of our society that come our way; each of us should make it part of our life's mission to seek them out, and show our love for Jesus, by how much we love and care for them.

Let us see Christ in others, and who knows, if we love them well enough, perhaps they may see Christ in us...



to the point

The gospel for this festival honouring Christ the King presents him enthroned in glory, judging the nations. The one who has shepherded us toward the day of judgment (see first reading) demands only that we have also shepherded one another. Thus, ultimately, judgment is based on whether we have lived as Christ.

Connecting the Gospel

· to the last two Sundays

What in the gospel is presented as a financial transaction ('entrusted his possessions') is, in the first reading, presented more intimately as a spousal relationship - the husband is 'entrusting his heart' to his wife (compare this with the parable of the bridegroom from last Sunday).

· to culture

We don't like being judged, but we tend to be quick to judge others. How different our judgments would be if we always realise that we are looking upon the face of Christ in the other!





30 November - St Andrew, Apostle



Did You Know...?

...that the Feast of Christ the King was instituted in 1925?

Of course, the idea of Christ as Universal King goes back to the early centuries of Christianity. St Cyril of Alexandria (early fifth century) spoke of Christ in this way, speaking of

Christ's dominion over all of creation by his very nature. Pope Pius XI established the feast by virtue of his encyclical Quas primas ("In the first") of 1925. It was very much a move aimed at countering the growing secularism of the time.







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
