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No place for the timid!

WE COME THIS WEEKEND to what is effectively the last Sunday in Ordinary Time. Though Advent does not begin for two weeks, next Sunday we celebrate the great Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (otherwise known more simply as Christ the King!) in which the readings have a focus on this distinct image of Christ.



We hear the Parable of the Talents in our Gospel this weekend. On the surface, it appears to be a repetition of

the lesson we learned last weekend; using our good works to prepare for the final judgement. Those who do not squander opportunities to show the face of Christ to others will be rewarded. However, this weekend's Parable of the Talents takes this idea of "being ready" and extends it by illustrating in a more explicit way how we are to use what God has given us to help the cause of our salvation when Jesus returns at the end of time.

The crux of the lesson in the Gospel lies in the servant who chose to bury the one talent (an ancient measurement of weight) he had been given by his master in order to preserve it, and then return that same single talent to his master on his return. This servant, out of fear and apprehension, did not want to risk what his master had entrusted to him, unlike the two other servants. The result: he suffers for his behaviour.

Like this servant, I think too often we are paralysed by fear in living out our faith. Certainly, we do not want to sin but, as I have often said, living out our faith based on simply (or not so simply) avoiding sin at all costs is not what is asked of us. From time to time, we need to take a risk to love as Jesus did. Timidity has no place in the life of a Christian. Jesus was never timid in his years of ministry; indeed, one could say that boldness was the hallmark of his life. Of course, Jesus never sinned. As we seek to love unconditionally as he did, making compassion, mercy, justice and charity manifest to others, we will get it wrong from time to time and, at the very least, make mistakes; at the very worst, sin. But as Pope Francis has noted, what is important is to try, and "getting our hands dirty" in the name of Christian love is not something to approach with timidity and fear.

In living our faith this way, we align ourselves not only with Christ but with the two servants in the parable who multiplied the talents given to them on trust. Just as Mary, in the Magnificat, stated with joy, "My soul magnifies the Lord", so too, we, through our loving actions towards others, magnify the Lord by making him known to all we encounter. This is why Jesus handed on his mission to the disciples. While on earth, Jesus was limited by time and space as we are. To make the Gospel known, he entrusted his mission to his disciples, and that extends to all the baptised, including you and me.


Let us commit ourselves to a boldness in our faith that is marked by living and loving like the Master.

to the point

We are familiar with this parable and its outcome: the industrious servants are rewarded, the lazy servant punished. We readily recognise this parable as a story of final judgment when the master (Christ) returns. But note: the parable begins with something wondrous - the master 'entrusted his possessions' to his servants. Similarly, the Christian life begins with unmerited and unimaginable blessing. When we are faithful it will end even more wondrously - we will enter fully into the 'master's joy.'

Connecting the Gospel

• to the first reading

What in the gospel is presented as a financial transaction ('entrusted his possessions') is, in the first reading, presented more intimately as a spousal relationship - the husband is 'entrusting his heart' to his wife (compare this with the parable of the bridegroom from last Sunday).

· to culture

In the corporate world people are rewarded with cash bonuses, profit sharing, trips, etc. The reward in the gospel, however, is far more than financial gain. It is sharing in our Master's joy.



His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness."

'Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he, "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."





Saint of the Week

22 November - St Cecilia (early 3rd century), Virgin, Martyr

Devotion to St Cecilia, in whose honour a basilica was constructed in Rome in the fifth century, has spread far and wide because of the Passion of Saint Cecilia, which holds her up as a perfect example of a Christian woman, who embraced virginity and suffered martyrdom for the love of Christ.

As with early martyrs, nothing much is known about Cecilia except her existence and her name; with the additional complication that so many stories have grown up round her that any remaining historical facts are obscured. No-one knows quite why she should suddenly have become popular in the middle of the sixth century, some 200 years after her death, and her association with music is also a mystery. It may be real, or it may come from the description in the Passion of Cecilia singing to God "in her heart" while the musicians were playing on her wedding day, or it may come from a linguistic confusion: where the Passion describes her being stifled to death candentibus organis, "with the pipes glowing red-hot," this could have been misread as cantantibus organis, "with the organ playing."
