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Peace amidst the cacophony of Christmas capitalism

ONE OF THE ironies of this time of year, as we draw closer to the Christmas season, is the Christian message of peace being drowned out by the noise of secular activity. As people crowd shopping centres and social venues in the weeks leading up to Christmas, noise and busyness hit a high and the frenetic activity makes it difficult for us to focus on the message entrusted to us through the Incarnation. Many of us may even feel obliged to engage in this noise and busyness, hoping to ameliorate some of its more unpleasant aspects by engaging in some religious ritual when, and if, the opportunity arises.



Of course, the peace that is the hallmark of Christian living is not about an absence of noise, but something more profound: a manner of living which gives us an inner stability and sense of calm because of the intimacy we experience with Christ and our Creator. Nonetheless, we cannot hope to have this intimacy if we are engaging in relentless activity that demands our attention be elsewhere. Most certainly, this time of year finds us at the greatest disadvantage because of the coincidence of end-of-year celebrations, Christmas, New Year, and, in this part of the world at least, summer holidays and the various distractions that accompany them.

Yet we cannot ignore the obligation to do as John the Baptist did when he arrived on the scene to "prepare a way for the Lord." John was a curiously striking figure. Unlike Jesus, for whose coming he laid the foundations, John was an ascetic individual whose manner of operation was nothing if not blunt. Regardless of the nature of our spirituality, we cannot prepare the way for Jesus' entry into the lives of others unless we ourselves choose to approach this season in a way which differs considerably from the madness and conspicuous consumption that seems to be the hallmark of a western Christmas.

One way that we can do this is to ask ourselves if there is a better way we can give a gift as a mark of our love yet at the same time confer a benefit on someone in true need. Much of the time we are scratching our heads to think of a gift to buy someone who needs nothing. Why not consider purchasing something from Caritas Australia's Global Gift program (see inside bulletin for details) in which you purchase a practical gift (clean water supply, a goat, a hygiene station) for someone in a developing nation? Your loved one will get an acknowledgment of what has been purchased whilst a person really in need gets the benefit. No more gift-induced anxiety, only to have your unwanted gift thrown in the back of a cupboard never to be seen again. This novel approach to the madness of the season is a wonderful way to witness to your faith by opening up a way for the Lord in the life of another!

This is just one way we can avoid at least a little of the "cacophony of Christmas capitalism." I'm sure that many other ways can be found to help rope in some of the madness which seizes many people at this time, understandably encouraged by those with a vested interest in unrestrained consumerism.


In doing so, we can be small but significant lights, pointing to the real meaning of Christmas to those who perhaps need reminding.

A Community Notice - Energy Rebates

It is a sad fact that up to half a million eligible concession holders in households for which they are the energy account holders, may miss out on up to \$785 this year to offset their energy bills and cost of living expenses. Part of the reason is that they are unaware of their entitlements and who possibly simply read the amount and due date of payment.

This plea is to spread that awareness to people such as elderly parents living apart from you and neighbours or friends living alone. Concession holders at the start of the 2023-24 financial year ought to check their bills to ascertain that they have received two rebates. Registration of your eligibility with your retailer that you are a concession card holder is essential. Self-funded retirees holding, or who are entitled to hold Commonwealth Seniors Health cards, are entitled to up to \$700 this year. In the latter case, yearly reregistration is required as circumstances regarding entitlement may have changed.

11 December - St Maria Maravillas of Jesus (1891-1974), Religious


Maria Maravillas was born at Madrid in 1891. She entered the El Escorial Carmel, Madrid on 12th October 1919. In 1924 she was inspired to found a Carmel at Cerro de los Angeles, alongside the monument to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. From this foundation followed nine others in Spain and one in India. She always gave first place to prayer and self-sacrifice. She had a true, passionate zeal for the glory of God and the salvation of souls. Even while living a life of poverty in the cloister she helped those who were in need, initiating apostolic, social and charitable works. In a particular way she helped those of her own order, priests, and other religious congregations. She died in the monastery of La Aldehuela, Madrid, on 11th December 1974. She was canonized on 4th May 2003 in Madrid.

Bethlehem means "House of Bread".







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

First, we should try to be holy like Saint Paul says. We should pray and do good. Then, we should make sure that we have repented of all our





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
