"Sir, we should like to see Jesus."

IF YOU WERE seeking examples of people who give enigmatic responses to seemingly simple and innocuous questions or requests, you would be hard pressed to find a better example than Jesus, especially as he is depicted in the Gospel of John. Take today's Gospel as a case in point. When some Greeks approach Philip asking to see Jesus, both Philip and Andrew go and tell Jesus this and, rather than responding with a simple yes or no to the request, he delivers a long and mysterious monologue about death and glorification.



For the Evangelist John, the glorification of Jesus centres on his crucifixion. You will remember that last weekend we heard Jesus say to Nicodemus that "The Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him." When the Israelites who had been bitten by the serpents – sent by God as a punishment for complaining during their forty years in the desert – looked upon the bronze serpent crafted by Moses and placed upon a staff, they were healed. The parallel with the crucified Jesus is clear: when we need forgiveness because of our failure to live as we are called to live as Christians, we need to turn towards the cross and gaze upon the crucified Jesus to know the healing power of forgiveness and mercy. When we look upon Jesus we are reminded of his sacrificial death, "crushed for our iniquities," as Isaiah states (53:5).

We can take the analogy even further. With the aid of the Holy Spirit, we are called to imitate Jesus in all words and actions. This means showing the same love, compassion, justice, care, concern, empathy, and sympathy as Jesus. When we make a conscious choice of forgiveness over vengeance, love over hatred, sympathy over indifference and so on, we can then be agents for healing in others. Making such conscious choices is rarely easy and requires something like death on our part, death to our natural tendencies to focus on self and a bolstered ego. We do not have to die, as Jesus did, but rather put to death all in us that is not Christ-like. The feelings of hatred and vengeance we have when we are wronged, the feeling of selfishness when we are blessed with something over another, and so on, come more naturally to most of us than we would care to acknowledge. It is these tendencies that must be "put to death" in us if we are to allow the seed planted in us at our baptism to germinate and flourish. The nourishment provided by prayer, the Eucharist and Reconciliation, as well as an openness to the work of the Holy Spirit, will help provide what is needed for this to happen.

Our aim in this Christian life is surely that when people look upon us as Christian disciples, they will have no problem in understanding that they are looking at Jesus.

But to be so profoundly like Jesus, we have first to die to self.

Embrace the Journey of Lent



FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Veiling of Crosses and Statues on Passiontide

With the Fifth Sunday of Lent, also known as Passion Sunday, we enter a solemn period of reflection and preparation for Holy Week. On this day, crosses and statues within the church are veiled, serving as a visual reminder of the church's journey into the heart of the Paschal Mystery. This veiling, a centuries-old tradition, symbolises the deepening of our contemplation as we draw nearer to the events of Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection. It invites us to look beyond the physical and to focus more intently on our spiritual journey. As we embrace the sacred traditions of Passion Sunday, it is an opportune time to reflect on the three pillars of Lent: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. These practices are not mere obligations but pathways to deeper communion with Christ and with one another.

Prayer invites us into a conversation with God, where we can express our gratitude, seek forgiveness, and discern God's will for our lives. Almsgiving extends our fasting and prayer into concrete action, urging us to look beyond ourselves and address the needs of our brothers and sisters. It is a call to charity, to share our blessings with those in need, reflecting Christ's love and compassion in our lives.

This Passion Sunday, let us embrace these pillars of Lent with renewed vigour, recognising them as avenues of grace. As the veils remind us to turn inward and reflect, may our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving draw us closer to the mystery of Christ's love for us—a love so profound that it embraces death to bring forth new life. Let this time of preparation deepen our longing for the joy of Easter, knowing that through the paschal mystery, we are invited into a life transformed by love.


Here is how your generous donations are distributed:




Pontifical Holy Land Good Friday Collection



Saint of the Week

23 March - St Turibius of Mongrovejo, Bishop (1538 - 1606)


He was born in Spain in about 1538 and studied law at the university of Salamanca. He was named bishop of Lima in 1580 and sailed to America. Full of apostolic zeal, he traversed his gigantic diocese three times, generally on foot, baptising, teaching and confirming the natives. He assembled many synods and councils to make the Church strong, organised, and above all holy; and he strongly defended the rights of the natives, who were Spanish citizens according to the law but who were nevertheless being oppressed by the colonists and the provincial governors. He died in Lima, Peru, on 23 March 1606.

Did You Know...?

...that the two creeds we use regularly at Mass, the Apostles’ Creed and the Nicene Creed, are not the only creeds of the Church?

Though rarely encountered by most of the faithful, other creeds include the Chalcedonian Creed (dating from 451 and named after the Council of Chalcedon), the Athanasian Creed (named after St Athanasius, its assumed author), and the Tridentine Creed, dating from the sixteenth century Council of Trent, held to counter the Protestant Reformation.



Unless a grain falls to the ground and dies...




