Scan and connect with us

Count the stars, if you can

WHEN ABRAM is asked by the Lord to look up into the heavens and to count the stars ("if you can," hint-hint), a crucial detail is missing which only appears later in the reading. Presumably, after looking up into the sky and seeing all the stars, Abram places his trust in the Lord, that indeed a child will be born to him and that thus shall be the number of his descendants. This faith "justifies" Abram, that is, makes things right between him and God – Abram trusts that God



will work things out as he has promised, and this trust is all important, what God had wanted from his children all along.

When we continue to read, however, we notice that after Abram had collected the animals and cut them in half, **the sun begins to set**. Which means that when Abram is brought outside and asked to look up into the sky and to count the number of the stars, he can't – it is broad daylight. Of course, Abram knows that indeed, when the sun sets, the stars will appear. But at the moment he is asked he can't see them, and this is the point. This is his faith. For although he cannot see how it will come about that he could possibly have descendants as many as the stars of heaven, given he and Sara's age and that they remain childless, he trusts in God's word that it will be so, just as he trusts that when the sun goes down the stars will show.

The faith of the disciples of Jesus is tested in a similar vein. Peter and James and John were given the privilege to see the Lord transfigured in glory. In part, the Lord gives them this glimpse of his true identity in order to prepare them for the trials that were to come. When Jesus is persecuted and maligned by the authorities and beaten by them, when they strip him of his dignity, the disciples are asked to remain faithful. They are given the chance to trust that despite it being difficult to see how it will be so, Jesus is the Messiah and that they will see him again in glory.

So, it is with us in our spiritual life. Many times, in our life, we will be asked to step outside and to count the number of the stars, as it were, and to look up and see only clear blue skies. Many times, what God promises will *seem* impossible. Many times, we will have to trust in his word and live according to it without seeing the way paved out before us. Many times, we will be given just one step, and we may not see how that step will lead to the fulfillment of the promise (just as it seems peculiar how the animal sacrifice will yield abundant descendants). But this is the faith that justifies us.



CONTINUING OUR LENTEN JOURNEY: THE PILLAR OF FASTING

Last week, we entered more deeply into the discipline of prayer and silence, seeking to still our hearts and listen to God's voice. This week, we turn our focus to fasting, a powerful Lenten practice that strengthens our relationship with God and aligns our hearts with his will.

Fasting in the Catholic Tradition

Fasting is not merely an act of self-denial; it is a profound expression of love for God and detachment from the world. From the earliest days of the Church, fasting has been a way for the faithful to discipline the body, purify the soul, and open the heart to grace. Through fasting, we acknowledge that our deepest hunger is not for material sustenance, but for the living God.

In Scripture, fasting is a sacred act of repentance, humility, and intercession. When Nineveh repented, they fasted and turned from sin (Jonah 3:5-10). When Queen Esther sought God's intervention, she fasted (Esther 4:16). Above all, Christ himself fasted for forty days in the wilderness, battling temptation and preparing for his mission (Matthew 4:1-2). He teaches us, "When you fast, do not look gloomy like the hypocrites... but when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by others but by your Father who is in secret" (Matthew 6:16-18).

Fasting is not about outward appearances but inner transformation. It detaches us from worldly comforts and strengthens our dependence on God. St Basil the Great reminds us, "Fasting gives birth to prophets and strengthens the strong; fasting makes lawgivers wise." It is a discipline that refines the soul, subdues the passions, and increases charity, for when we voluntarily go without, we become more attuned to those who suffer involuntarily.

A Challenge for the Week: Fasting with Purpose

This week, let us fast not merely from food, but from whatever weakens our devotion to God. Consider:

- A traditional fast Abstain from a meal or from excess, offering your hunger as a prayer.
- A fast of the senses Reduce distractions such as social media, idle conversations, or entertainment to create space for silence and prayer.
- A fast united with almsgiving Redirect what you would have spent on food or comforts toward someone in need, making your sacrifice an act of love.

Donations can be placed in the allocated space in the chapel or given in to the parish office or to one of the clergy in the cathedral. We need:



Scrutinies for our Elect

Last Sunday here at St Patrick's Cathedral we hosted the Rite of Election for all those adults across the Parramatta Diocese who are seeking initiation into the Catholic Church in their various parishes this Easter, at the Easter Vigil, on 19 April. Bishop Vincent noted that there was a record number of catechumens this year, at least a record number for many years, and this was certainly the case for our own parish which has **twelve** catechumens, now elect, who are seeking to be baptised, confirmed and receive Eucharist. There were two other parishes with eleven seeking initiation and many other parishes with numbers greater than in recent years. What is the reason for this? Who knows? But thank God!

Next Sunday, and for the two Sundays following, at the Saturday Vigil Mass, our elect will undergo the short rituals known as the scrutinies. The purpose of these rituals is, to quote briefly from the rite, "...to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good." (n.128)

Please continue to keep the elect in your prayers, as well as the four candidates who, already baptised, will be confirmed on Easter Sunday.

Saint of the Week

22 March - St Nicholas Owen (c.1560-1606), Martyr

Nicholas Owen was born around 1550 into a Catholic family and grew to manhood during the time of the Penal Laws. He became a carpenter, and for thirty years or more built hiding-places for priests in the homes of Catholic families. He frequently travelled from one house to another, under the name of "Little John", accepting only the necessities of life as payment before starting off for a new project. To minimize the likelihood of betrayal he often worked at night, and always alone. The number of hiding-places he constructed will never be known. Early in 1606 he was arrested, giving himself up voluntarily in the hope of distracting attention from some priests who were hiding nearby. After being committed to the Marshalsea, Owen was then removed to the Tower. He was executed on 2 March 1606. It was written of him that "no man can be said to have done more good of all those who laboured in the English vineyard. He was the immediate occasion of saving the lives of many hundreds of persons, both ecclesiastical and secular."



Did You Know...?

...that on the Third. Fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent, the Gospels for Year A may be used, regardless of the liturgical year?

This is encouraged particularly when there are catechumens preparing for baptism in the parish, but they can be used regardless. These readings are familiar to us: the Samaritan woman at the well, the healing of the man born blind, and the raising of Lazarus from the dead - all stories of the revelation of Jesus as Saviour,

encouraging those adults preparing for baptism to continue to deepen their relationship with Jesus in the final stages of their preparation for initiation into the Catholic Church.
