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Opportunities not to be missed...

AFTER NEARLY forty days of our Lenten journey, we come to the cusp of Holy Week, Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. Though often referred to as simply Palm Sunday, omitting the reference to the Lord's Passion which occupies the Gospel reading for today is to do this day a disservice. This Sunday not only highlights Jesus' entry into Jerusalem but also the very reason he made his way there: for his Passion and, as we celebrate with joy next Sunday, his Resurrection and all that entails for us as a people who would otherwise be lost.



The readings for today's Mass are full of drama, something which has not escaped the notice of artists,

film makers and musicians over the centuries. From the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem through to his burial, we experience a range of emotions that rivals just about any other day of the liturgical year. It is a story of triumph to tragedy, though the denouement, the final triumph, awaits us next Sunday on the feast of the Resurrection.

The drama is played out for us very effectively through the liturgies that occupy Holy Week. These gifts of the Church are something I would encourage you all to embrace so as to draw from them the enormous spiritual nourishment that is on offer.

Holy Week is more than the ever-popular Good Friday, which draws huge crowds to churches all over the world. Important and well known as Good Friday may be, there is so much more to Holy Week. Here at the Cathedral, we are privileged to have not only beautifully executed liturgies but also some celebrations that are not found in many other parishes in our diocese. On Monday of Holy Week (14 April) we celebrate the beautiful liturgy called Tenebrae, which sees the cathedral in darkness for the most part, paired with some beautiful readings and music. This is a moving liturgy that sets the tone for the remainder of Holy Week. If you have not yet had the chance to experience Tenebrae, I encourage you to do so. The liturgy, beginning at 7:30pm, lasts a little over an hour.

Wednesday evening sees the celebration of the Chrism Mass, in which the clergy and the faithful from around the diocese gather with Bishop Vincent. The clergy renew their ordination promises, and the oils are consecrated which will be used in various sacraments in the year ahead. This is a Mass which is open to everyone, so please come along!

The Mass of the Lord's Supper on Thursday evening (7:30pm), marks the beginning of the Paschal (Easter) Triduum. We recall the Last Supper and Jesus' great act of servant leadership in washing the feet of his disciples. Friday is dedicated solely to the Lord's Passion, with the Stations of the Cross being prayed from 10:00am, and the Commemoration of the Lord's Passion from 3:00pm.

Holy Saturday (please don't call it Easter Saturday!) is a day of reflection as we remember our Lord's descent to the realm of the dead. This day ends with the holiest and most joyous celebration of the Easter Vigil (6:30pm), marking the beginning of the Easter season. Alleluias and a festival of light mark this Mass, and we rejoice not only in the Lord's resurrection but also the new life that will be afforded those being initiated into the Church.

Plenty of opportunities - please make the most of them!

PALM SUNDAY – THE TRIUMPH AND THE TURNING

This weekend, we enter the solemn and sacred journey of Holy Week, beginning with Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. As we gather, we hold palms in our hands - a symbol of Christ's kingship, but also a paradox of his impending suffering. The crowd that welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem with cries of "Hosanna!" is the same crowd that, just days later, will cry "Crucify him!"

Palm Sunday is rich in contrast: joy and sorrow, celebration and silence, triumph and betrayal. It invites us to sit within the tension of a world that does not fully understand its Saviour. As disciples today, we are challenged to do more than remember; we are invited to enter the mystery.

The liturgical colour changes to red, marking a distinct shift in tone. Red, the colour of blood and fire, signifies both the passion of Christ and the burning love that led him to the cross. It is a visual reminder that the triumphal entry is not an end in itself - it is the beginning of the road to Calvary. Red also reflects the martyrdom of Christ, foreshadowing the sacrifice he willingly embraced out of love for humanity.

This Sunday, as we hold our palms, we are called not merely to wave them in symbolic gesture, but to carry them as a sign of discipleship - to walk with Christ through his suffering, knowing that through the cross comes resurrection.

May our participation in this sacred week deepen our faith, renew our hearts, and prepare us to celebrate the joy of Easter with new understanding.

HOLY WEEK AT ST PATRICK'S

RCIA and the Sacred Journey into Holy Week



As we enter the most sacred days of our liturgical year - Holy Week we do so accompanied by the quiet, courageous witness of our RCIA candidates and catechumens, who are preparing to be fully initiated into the life of the Church at the Easter Vigil.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a journey of faith, reflection, and deep personal transformation. For many months, these individuals have prayerfully discerned God's call, learning about the teachings of the Church, engaging with Scripture, and sharing their stories in a spirit of community. They have experienced moments of conversion, healing, and growing trust in Christ, all supported by the prayers and encouragement of our parish.

Now, as they prepare to receive the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist, they enter into the heart of Holy Week - walking spiritually with Jesus from his triumphant entry into Jerusalem, through his Passion and death, and into the glory of his Resurrection. Their journey is not simply a personal milestone, but a powerful witness to all of us of what it means to say "yes" to the Christian life.

At the Easter Vigil, the Church will rejoice as our catechumens rise from the waters of Baptism into new life, are anointed with the Holy Spirit, and receive the Body and Blood of Christ for the first time. Those already baptised in another Christian tradition will be received into full communion and confirmed, completing their journey into the Catholic faith.

Let's make every effort to ensure that all who walk through our doors during these sacred days feel welcomed, seen, and part of our worshipping community!


A gentle reminder: Parking during Holy Week and Easter

Saint of the Week

17 April - Blessed Clara Gambacorta (1362-1419), Nun and Widow

Blessed Clara was born in Pisa in 1362, married at the age of twelve and widowed at the age of fifteen. She longed to join a religious order, but her family objected. When at last they relented, upon the advice of Saint Catherine of Siena she received the Dominican habit at the Monastery of the Holy Cross in Pisa. In 1385 along with Blessed Maria Mancini she founded the Monastery of Saint Dominic in Pisa where regular observance was strictly maintained. She was noted for her great prudence and charity, especially in pardoning the assassin of her father and brothers. She prized study and urged her sisters to do likewise. She died on April 17, 1419.



Holy Week

Today is the beginning of Holy Week, when we specially remember the last days of Jesus and His death on the cross.

The Sunday before Jesus died, He came riding into Jerusalem on a donkey. All the people cheered for Him. They laid down their cloaks and palm branches on the road to honour Him. That was Palm Sunday.

On the first Holy Thursday Jesus offered the first Mass ever. He took bread and wine and changed them into His Body and Blood and gave them to His Apostles to eat and drink. The same thing happens at every Mass when the priest says Jesus' words at the Consecration. We don't see the bread or wine change, but they are still really Jesus, offering Himself to God for us.

Good Friday is the day that Jesus died on the cross. The leaders of the Jews got the people to turn against Him. After an unfair trial, Jesus was whipped harshly and made to carry a cross up a hill. Then He was nailed to the cross and hung there until He died. Only His mother and a few of His friends were with Him.



ROMANMEMASS





On Good Friday morning, JESUS, who had been arrested the night before, was judged by Pontius Pilate, the ROMAN governor. Pilate had him WHIPPED. Then to make fun of Him the SOLDIERS made a CROWN of THORNS and put it on His head. They threw a purple cloth on Him and beat Him with RODS, saying, "Hail, KING of the JEWS!" Then Pilate had Jesus brought out in front of the people and asked them what they wanted to do with Him. The people, who had welcomed Him into JERUSALEM a few days before with their HOSANNAS, now shouted that He should be crucified.

So Jesus was made to CARRY a heavy CROSS out of the city and up a big HILL. Because He was so weak from being beaten, a man named SIMON of Cyrene was forced to help Him. The soldiers tore off Jesus' CLOTHES and attached Him to the cross with NAILS through His hands and feet.

Jesus offered His life for our SINS. He hung on the cross for three HOURS until He DIED. Nearby were His mother MARY, JOHN the Apostle, and Mary MAGDALEN. After He died a soldier stuck a SPEAR into His side to be sure He was dead.

Did you know that at every MASS we re-offer Jesus' sacrifice on the cross in an unbloody way on the altar?
