




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What exactly is the problem?

TODAY'S FIRST READING shows a beautiful picture of the early Church. A powerful picture of a faithful, courageous, loving community. A picture of a community so full of love that the people around them praised them and great numbers were drawn to join them, even though it was clearly dangerous to be with them. And this was not just some sentimental love – this love had power behind it. Power that showed itself in signs and wonders – people healed, evil spirits driven out. It sounds a lot like Jesus' ministry, and so it should - Jesus promised them that they would do the same kind of



So, what is our problem? Why do we not do these kind of wonderful things – healings, casting out evil spirits? Why do people not praise our community? Why are they not drawn in great numbers to us? Were the promises only for the early Christians? Does the Holy Spirit not work anymore? Has he grown old, or tired?

Well, the problem is not the promises – if we are disciples of Christ, then every promise made to them was made to us. And the problem is not the Holy Spirit – the Holy Spirit is alive and kicking. So, if the problem is not with the promises, and not with the Holy Spirit, then the problem must be us.

Perhaps we are not the faithful, courageous, loving community that we should be. Is our faith like that of Thomas – are we lukewarm, do we need just a little more proof? Or are we afraid to call on the Holy Spirit? Are we not courageous – how do we give witness to our faith? Do we keep our faith private, afraid to show the people around us who we are, and what we stand for? Are we a visible community of love, or are we a community that just shares certain religious practices? If someone came to our Mass, would they be welcomed? If they looked in our bulletin, would they see lots of opportunities to join groups doing good works? Would outsiders find people from our community actively working with refugees, homeless, marginalised people?

The Holy Spirit offers us grace, but for grace to be fruitful, we need to cooperate with that grace. We need to do our part. We need to allow the Holy Spirit to form us individually and as a community into the faithful, courageous, loving community that will naturally occur if we surrender to Him. The scriptures describing the early Church are not some sweet fairy tales for us to enjoy, they are a real model for what we must strive to be as a community. When we live like them, we will do what they did.

Ours is a wonderful parish. It is full of wonderful people. There are a growing number of people that are truly embracing their faith in a living and active way – getting involved in Outreach, Social Justice, Evangelisation. They are growing in their faith, growing in their courage, growing in their love. This week, as we celebrate our Risen Lord, as we celebrate the life of our faithful, courageous, loving Pope Francis, let us add to their numbers. Let each of us finish Lent, and embrace Easter by taking a step into a new life.

Archbishop Timothy Costelloe meets Pope Francis in 2022

Australian Catholic Bishops Conference reflection on Pope Francis

Australian Catholic Bishops Conference President, Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB, says Pope Francis will be remembered as a man of simplicity, humility and compassion.

Pope Francis, born Jorge Mario Bergoglio, became the first non-European pope in centuries, the first Latin American pope, the first Jesuit pope and the first to take the name Francis when he was elected to succeed Pope Benedict XVI in 2013.

"The sad news of the death of Pope Francis, while it does not come as a surprise given his age and his declining health in recent years, will be received with great sadness by Catholics, and by people of good will, all over the world," Archbishop Costelloe said.

"When Cardinal Bergoglio appeared on the balcony overlooking Saint Peter's Square on 14 March 2013, and was introduced to the world as the newly-elected Pope Francis, his simplicity and humility set the tone for a papacy which would be marked by an emphasis on the mercy and compassion of God, and on the Church's vocation to be a sign and bearer of that merciful love in an increasingly troubled world.

"His famous description of the Church as a field hospital where wounds could be healed and hearts could be warmed was a call to a renewal of the Church's life and mission, grounded in a return to Christ as the source and inspiration of everything the Church sought to do and to be.

"The 12 years of the papacy of Pope Francis were not without controversy. His constant call that the Church should be open to everybody caused some to fear that he was putting at risk the integrity of the Church's faith and moral teaching.

He himself insisted, however, that he was 'a loyal son of the Church' who, in recognising his own sinfulness, had come to understand that it was the task of the Church, as it was the task of Christ, to embrace people in their brokenness and fragility and lead them to healing and wholeness."

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Archbishop Costelloe got to know Pope Francis better over the past couple of years in his roles as president of the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia and as a key figure in supporting the Synod on Synodality.

Parishes around the country will hold special memorial Masses for Pope Francis in the coming days. Information on those commemorations can be found on local parish and cathedral websites.

"While the Catholic Church, and indeed the whole world, will now turn its attention to the election of a new pope, faithful Catholics will also be praying for Pope Francis, that the mercy and compassion of God which he proclaimed to the world will now embrace him as he enters into the mystery of eternal life," Archbishop Costelloe said.

"They will also join with so many others around the world who will remember with gratitude the simple goodness of a humble man who was ready to make of his whole life a gift of love and service, not just for his fellow Catholics but for everybody.

"May he rest in peace."

The process of the election of a new pope will unfold in the coming days and weeks.

Cardinal Mykola Bychok CSsR, head of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Saints Peter and Paul, will be the sole attendee from Australia at the conclave.

Australian Church and civic representatives are expected to travel to Rome for Pope Francis' funeral.

Entrusted with the solemn responsibility of choosing the next Successor of St Peter, the Cardinals are called to set aside personal concerns and listen attentively to the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

We invite all parishioners of St Patrick's Cathedral to join the universal Church in prayer for the Cardinals, that they may be united in faith, wisdom, and openness to God's will.

Below is a prayer shared by the Vatican for this sacred time:

Prayer for the Cardinals in Conclave

Lord Jesus Christ, eternal Shepherd of your Church, You constantly guide your people with wisdom and love. We entrust to you the Cardinals who will gather in conclave. Send upon them the Holy Spirit, that they may discern your will and choose a Pope

who will, with a father's heart, lead your Church in truth, mercy, and unity.

May he be a shepherd after your own heart, courageous in mission.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Saint of the Week

28 April - St Peter Chanel (1803 - 1841), Priest, Martyr

Peter Chanel was born in France, at Cuet (near Belley), in 1803. He had been a priest for three years when he was accepted by the Marists, a missionary order. He was sent out to evangelize the island of Futuna in the Pacific, where cannibalism had only recently been banned by the local ruler, Niuliki. At first all went well, and Father Chanel and his lay assistants made many converts; but as he learned the local language and gained the confidence of the people, Niuliki became jealous and fearful; and the baptism of his son and his son's friends was the last straw. While Father Chanel's companions were away, Niuliki sent men who set upon him and clubbed him to death. His mission had lasted only three years: he is the first martyr of the South Seas.

Did You Know...?

...that the conclave which will meet soon to elect a Pope to succeed Pope Francis, is made up of cardinals who are aged eighty or younger?

Although the inital meetings and discussions prior to the conclave are open to all cardinals regardless of age, the voting body is made up only of those cardinals eighty years old or younger. They can vote up to four times a day in order to secure

a successor. The word "conclave" means essentially "a locked room", coming from the Latin word for key, "clavem".
